Established in 1987, VCCF invests the charitable capital that drives the philanthropic engines of Ventura County. Its portfolio performance ranks in the

Its portfolio performance ranks in the top 11 of all community foundations in the United States for long-term growth. It owns the VCCF Nonprofit Center in Camarillo - a place where nonprofits and the community can come together to work together. VCCF's mission statement is "To promote and enable philanthropy to improve our community. For Good. For Ever." To that end their mission goals are:

- Stewarding legacies through careful management of the charitable capital entrusted to us and protecting donor intent in perpetuity
- Investing in the future through scholarships, grantmaking and collaborative partnerships
- Strengthening nonprofit leadership through our Center for Nonprofit Leadership.

Stephanie Wilson is the Capital Campaign Coordinator for VCCF. She works with foundations, corporations and individuals to build relationships and legacies that will sustain the VCCF Nonprofit Center for years to come. She is charged with raising the funds for the center, our new 53,500-square-foot building that serves the county as a hub for nonprofit collaboration.

Stephanie joined the VCCF staff in 2013, after completing two successful capital campaigns in Ventura County. Her professional career began in the motion picture industry and worked its way into the nonprofit world with the 1984 Olympic Arts Festival. Currently, Stephanie is a Cultural Affairs commissioner for the city of Thousand Oaks.

Meet the 'Linchpin' in the Global Fight Against Polio

Last fall, after nearly three years of turmoil, chemical attacks and the slaughtering and scattering of millions, the situation in Syria suddenly got bleaker: polio was back. In late October, the first 10 cases were officially confirmed. To Syria, the devastating and once-eradicated virus had returned after 14 years. For polio fighters, it also meant a potential spark for a wider outbreak — and the latest threat to the biggest, costliest and most ambitious public health campaign in history.

That morning, however, a bespectacled Newfoundlander

She is particularly proud of help to impoverished women, having lifted some 70% of that clientele out of poverty.

To date, WEV has loaned over \$3.5 million to some 2000 businesses. They reach out to men as well, but women represent about 86% of its clients who must undergo rigorous training.

The balance of the presentation was given over to a WEV success story. Shauna Mistretta has managed to successfully create a socially-conscious business called Beads of Esiteti with the help of the WEV program. She works with Masai tribal women in northern Kenya, selling their handcrafted beaded jewelery they create in the US. Funds that return to the Masai help to improve village life, particularly education and female empowerment.

was setting a plan in
motion. Bruce Aylward,
a 51-year-old doctor and
epidemiologist with the
World Health Organization,
had taken a red-eye to
Oman, where he was quickly
pulled into a meeting with
worried health ministers
from across the Middle
East. "What I needed to do
then was convince the 22
ministers in the room that
we were dealing with an



emergency," said Aylward, the WHO's assistant directorgeneral for polio eradication and humanitarian response. "(I said) 'We are going to need, within four weeks, to start vaccinating 23 million kids — from Egypt right up through Syria, southern Turkey and all of Iraq. This is not about Syria. This is a Middle East outbreak."

By the following week, the region's largest-ever immunization campaign was underway — several rounds of vaccination for millions of children across seven countries and territories.

Today, the crisis is far from over. Syria now has at least 39 cases and the outbreak recently spread to Iraq, where a baby boy in Baghdad tested positive. The WHO has been criticized for not acting sooner on an outbreak many feared would come. But the disaster surely would have spread farther and wider if not for that early push.


In the 26-year, multibillion-dollar crusade known as the Global Polio Eradication Initiative, Aylward is just one of many players. The initiative is a sprawling partnership of governments, international organizations including Rotary International, health workers and volunteers, many of whom risk their lives on the front lines. But the complicated effort also needs a driver and Aylward is among the few who hold the keys.

"I think many people would consider Bruce Aylward the key figure in polio eradication," said retired U.S. ambassador John Lange of the UN Foundation, who cochairs an advisory body for the initiative. "He is, in many respects, a linchpin for the program."

After his retirement Tyler became a Real Estate Broker and was owner and CEO of "The Financial Firm" in Ventura. Tyler also earned his Presidential Key Executive MBA from Pepperdine University in 2008.


