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Aspire: Entrepreneur Education Initiative

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Today's presentation comes from Sean Bhardwaj.

Earlier this year, in March, students across Ventura were fine-tuning business proposals in time for a program finale that resembled "Shark Tank," the reality show about entrepreneurs looking for a willing investor. But instead of snarky billionaire investors, students from Ventura College and Foothill Tech, Buena, Pacific and Ventura high schools made pitches to community and business leaders.

The project is part of Aspire: Entrepreneur Education Initiative, a program directed by Sean Bhardwaj, a Foothill Tech alumnus and USC graduate. Bhardwaj, 24, has helped create a four-week curriculum like what might be found at a business school. The project requires students to work in a group to brainstorm an idea, create a business plan and launch a website. Graduating students need these kinds of skills as they enter a competitive, digitized workforce, Bhardwaj said.

"Before, you would go to college, and if you were set in the straight and narrow, you're set for life," Bhardwaj said. "Now the impetus for this generation is to create their own opportunities, find what they're passionate about."

Economics teacher Kurt Miller, 26, has been encouraging students to think of a profitable business that investors can sink their teeth into. "At the end of the day, they want to know how they're going to make money from your business plan," Miller told his students. "Be confident. You own this."

The idea is to get students to collaborate and find solutions



across multiple academic subjects, something Bhardwaj calls "deep learning." That concept also is the cornerstone of the Common Core standards, a new set of academic expectations to be implemented in fall 2014. Common Core favors long-term class projects overwork sheets and assessment that's based on performance rather than multiplechoice exams. "It's not that multiple choice is the issue; it's using that as the only metric in school," Miller said. "With the business project,

students do not necessarily have to answer questions on a test. They have to come up with their own questions."

Kathy Asher, assistant superintendent of the Ventura Unified School District, said that when Common Core takes effect, classrooms will look just like the district classrooms working on the business plans today, "What struck me is: Here is this economics class utilizing math in terms of their budget ... marketing skills, PowerPoint presentations, public speaking," Asher said after judging an early round of pitches at Foothill Tech. "This is Common Core state standards at its best."

Program

Ron Calkins introduced the program, newly hired Ventura City Manager, Mark Watkins. An apt introducer, it turned out as Ron, retired City Engineer, was the one who hired Mark in 1987 as an engineer on his staff. Mark eventually took a position at the City of Thousand Oaks, but maintained his home in Ventura. Mark has three children. He likes to sail and surf and has conquered all 14,000 foot high peaks in California.

Mark shared the extent of his responsibilities in the City, overseeing some 600 employees and a \$89.6 million general fund. There has been a budget decrease of \$18 million over the last 5 years, even with increasing revenues. This is due to the need to pay off borrowing that has occurred recently.

The comparison between Thousand Oaks and Ventura is a striking comparison between a very young city and a very old city, with the attending infrastructure issues and

Pakistan and Israel hit by polio setback

The battle to eliminate polio has hit apparent setbacks in northern Pakistan, where new cases are being reported, and in Israel, where the discovery of the virus in the sewage system has led to a mass immunization campaign. Fourteen suspected cases of polio have been discovered in Pakistan's insurgency-racked north-west, where Taliban militants have banned vaccination workers. Although the country is awaiting the result of tests on stool samples from the affected children, a surge in cases could strike a major blow to the government's intense efforts to exit the small group of nations that has failed to eradicate the disease. All but two of the children were from North Waziristan, the most troubled of the seven tribal "agencies" that comprise the Federally Administered Tribal Areas, a semi-autonomous region of Pakistan that borders Afghanistan and is a hotbed for militancy.

The majority of strikes by the CIA's unmanned drone campaign occur in North Waziristan, a situation that last year prompted Taliban commander Hafiz Gul Bahadur to block the anti-polio campaign in the agency. Militants in other areas have enacted similar bans, saying they will lift them only when drone strikes end. In North and South Waziristan, more than 260,000 chidren under five have not been immunized since June 2012. In tribal, highly conservative parts of the country health workers are regarded with intense suspicion. Popular fears are often stoked by local religious leaders who claim the vaccines are part of a western plot to sterilize Muslims.

According to the global polio eradication initiative, 181 cases had been recorded worldwide this year between January and 13 August. A total of 71 were in Afghanistan, Nigeria and Pakistan, countries where the disease is endemic.

Bruce Aylward, who leads the World Health Organization's global polio eradication campaign, pointed out that the actions of Gul Bahadur were not in line with the expressed views of the Afghan Taliban, which published a statement on its website two months ago about the importance of vaccinating children against polio (with the rider that it should be done in a manner appropriate for Muslims).

Meanwhile, Israel has launched a mass inoculation program, aimed at reaching more than a million children

over the next three months, after one of the three strains of polio was detected in the country's sewage system. No one in Israel has developed the virus since the discovery of type one in the south of the country earlier this year. It has since spread to sewage systems in the centre and the north. Type one was identified in neighboring Egypt in December.

Drops containing vaccine against types one and three of the virus are being administered orally at health clinics. Israel routinely immunises children against polio, but this campaign aims to boost the level of protection. About 182,000 children were inoculated in the first three days.
