PRESENTATION—MIKE SCHWARTZ—HANUKKAH

Club member Mike Schwartz discussed the historical roots and celebration of Hanukkah. The talk (and additional material below) is based on his family's celebration of the holiday augmented by some reading.

When is Hanukkah this year? The answer is simple: the same dates it is every year—eight nights starting the 25th of Kislev! The Jewish calendar is lunar; some years have 12 months and some have 13 months, so the date shifts around on the Gregorian calendar. For 2022, Hanukkah is December 19 (which starts the evening of Sunday, December 18) through December 26.

Hanukkah celebrates the military victory in 165 B.C. of a group of Jews over the much larger army of the Syrian-Greeks. The Syrian-Greeks were ruled by Antiochus (ann-TIE-uh-cuss) IV, who was King of Syria and ruler of the powerful Seleucid (sell-LU-cid) Empire. He attempted to force the Jews in Judea to convert to Greek polytheism. He banned circumcision and killed circumcised babies by hanging. He slaughtered 40,000 Jews and sold another 40,000 into slavery.

One group who refused to convert hid in the hills. They were attacked by the Syrian-Greek army but refused to fight back because it was the sabbath. Mattathias, who had five sons, decided that if they refused to fight on the sabbath, the Jews would be wiped off the face of the earth. One of his sons, Judah Maccabee ("The Hammer") organized an army and fought back.

After three years of fighting, the Maccabees were victorious. They reclaimed the Temple in Jerusalem and removed the statute of Zeus. According to tradition, they found only enough holy oil to burn for one night. But by a miracle, it burned for eight nights while the Jews were able to prepare more oil.

The Maccabean Revolt is described in the 1st and 2nd books of Maccabees. These books are in the Apocrypha and are an interesting read. They are not included in most versions of the Bible but can be found online on in Catholic and Greek/Russian Orthodox Bibles such as the Revised Standard Version.

The First Book of Maccabees states the holiday is to be celebrated for eight days each year. The Menorah is lit, starting with one candle (plus the "shamash," or servant candle) on the first night, two on the second night, etc. It is a joyous holiday that includes playing Dreidel, singing, eating latkes (potato pancakes, which were served at our meeting) and jelly donuts (because, like latkes, they are cooked in oil). The tradition of giving Hanukkah Gelt (Yiddish for "money") has evolved into chocolate coins and the giving of Hanukkah presents.

Following the presentation, club members played Dreidel using chocolate Hanukkah Gelt. The Hebrew letters on the Dreidel originally stood for the Yiddish words Ganz (all), Halb (half), Nichts (nothing) and Stell (put), which are almost all the instructions you need to play the game. The letters were reinterpreted to represent a Hebrew phrase meaning "A Great Miracle Happened There" (or in Israel, "A Great Miracle Happened Here").

Hanukkah can be considered a minor Jewish holiday because it is not mentioned in the Torah and does not require fasting or staying off work. Its prominence increased in the United States based on its proximity on the calendar to Christmas. But it retains its significance as a celebration of the victory of freedom over oppression.
