ONDULANDO FIREWISE

Ben Rode and Nancy O'Rode gave a presentation on behalf of Ondulando Firewise at our meeting November 29, 2023. They discussed the efforts of the 640 property owners in the neighborhood to enhance fire safety, which has been recognized as a Firewise USA community.

It must have painful for them to discuss how they lost their house in the Thomas Fire, but they appeared in good spirits as they showed photos of their former house and discussed each of the fire hazards on the property, which were identified by number in the photos.





Some of the hazards they identified:

- Vegetation near the house and next to wood paneling
- Flammable vegetation like palm trees
- Plants above the roof line
- Wood mulch near home
- Flammable welcome mats & seat cushions near house
- Plastic rather than glass skylights
- Plastic rather than metal rain gutters, and full of leaves
- Single pane windows

Attic vents with $\frac{1}{4}$ inch mesh can allow embers to enter the home. They should be replaced with $\frac{1}{8}$ inch or better yet $\frac{1}{16}$ inch mesh. Cement or brick paving can reduce the spread of fire. There should be a 0-5 foot non-ignition zone next to the house.

You can get a FREE visit to your home followed by recommendations to harden your home against wildfire. It's up to you to follow the recommendations or not. Sign up on the website for FireSafe Council, Ventura Regional.

December 6 lunch meeting: Ventura City Manager Bill Ayub

(pronounced A-yoob). Bill was appointed by the Ventura City Council to serve as its city manager on August 8th, 2023. As the city manager, Bill is the chief staffer of the Council and oversees all of the City's services over 11 departments and more than 700 employees.

Prior to his service as Ventura's city manager, Bill served a 37year career in law enforcement, including four years as the 20th sheriff of Ventura County, before retiring in January of 2023. Bill joined the Ventura County Sheriff's Office in April of 1996, after serving as a police officer for several years in the City of North Las Vegas, Nevada and the City of Port Hueneme.

Bill's diverse and extensive law enforcement experience ranges from assignments in patrol, custody, SWAT, academy instructor, investigations, and administration. Prior to being elected sheriff, Bill served at every rank from deputy sheriff through assistant sheriff.

Bill has a Master of Science degree in Emergency Services Administration from California State University at Long Beach and a Bachelor of Arts degree in Psychology from California State University at Northridge. Bill was born and raised in Ventura and has been married to his wife, Stacey, for 31 years. They have three adult children and still make Ventura their home.

Rotary Team Trip to Ak' Tenamit in Guatemala

Destination: Ak' Tenamit, a boarding school of over 600 Indigenous Mayan students aged 12-18 in the Rio Dulce area of Eastern Guatemala. Numerous Rotary clubs (including The Fort Lauderdale Rotary Club) have built and supported this school for over 20 years.

Purpose: To gain an understanding of the needs of children in this region of Guatemala, and to provide assistance at the school, which is viewed as a model globally for its grassroots approach to vocational education.

Potential Tasks: Light construction, computer training, teaching (English and Spanish, agricultural methods, hygiene, healthcare, CPR), aiding in healthcare clinics. All ages (14 and up) and fitness levels can take part.

Dates of the Trip: February 18 to February 25, 2024

Transportation and Meals (total trip costs \$1300 to \$1800)

- <u>Flights:</u> Arrivals: American Airlines and United fly into San Pedro Sula(SPS), Honduras. Private transportation will take us from SPS to Puerto Barrios.
 Departures: Private transportation will take us back to San Pedro Sula. Flights booked individually.
- <u>Hotels</u>: Villa Caribe in Livingston (7 nights); booked by host and payable at end of stay.
- <u>Transportation from hotels to school:</u> Covered motorized boats holding twelve people. \$100.00 deposit at time of registration will cover all transportation.
- <u>Meals</u>: Lunch at school restaurant; dinner at Buga Mama restaurant in Livingston. Both school-owned and managed; paid individually at end of trip.

Ak' Tenamit: A Mayan Term Meaning "New Village"

Ak' Tenamit was started in 1990, with a first class of 11 boys and 3 girls. It was founded by Steve Dudenhoefer from Florida, who remains today as the Chief Technical Advisor of Asociación AK' Tenamit. The school today has over 600 Indigenous Mayan students and is managed entirely by the Q'eqchi people. It is viewed as a model globally for its effective grassroots approach to vocational education, income generation, and health care. The goals of Ak' Tenamit are to:

- Provide shelter and education for at-risk youth aged 12-18
- Help youths develop skills and gainful employment
- Establish internships and job opportunities
- Provide initial financial and emotional support for graduates to help ensure success

Hands-on experiences provide the knowledge and skills for gainful employment in Guatemala, which offers an alternative to migration. An outstanding number (85%) of students are employed shortly after graduation. This is because prior to graduation, students complete extensive work study programs in businesses off-campus. After employment, graduates pledge to give back a percentage of their income to their villages.

Rotarians have been huge supporters of Ak' Tenamit for over 20 years, contributing medical supplies and equipment, funds, and labor to build new dorms and classrooms, a floating dental clinic, solar energy equipment, computer labs, restaurant equipment and supplies, new boat engines, and family water filters.

Each year, groups of Rotarians from all over the USA spend a week at Ak' Tenamit to gain an understanding of the need of the children, and to provide assistance at the school. Districts 6930, 6990 and 5240 are now recruiting Rotarians and friends for a trip in February 18-25, 2024.
