
Guest Speaker

Debra Thomas

Award-winning Author

Debra Thomas is a Sarton Award winner for her debut novel, Luz. Her second novel, Josie and Vic, will be published April 2023. It is a story of love, loss, and forgiveness and conveys hope--even in the darkest of times. Originally from Binghamton, New York, she has lived in Southern California most of her adult life. After working a decade as a registered nurse, Debra returned to college to pursue her passion for literature and writing. She is a former English teacher at a Los Angeles public high school, as well as English as a Second Language (ESL) instructor to adults from all over the world. Her experiences as an immigrant rights advocate influence much of her writing. She currently lives with her husband and little dog in Simi Valley, California, just minutes away from her two horses.





PROGRAM—DEBRA THOMAS

Award-winning author and Simi Valley resident Debra Thomas addressed the Rotary Club of Ventura on February 15, 2023.

Debra always wanted to be a novelist but life got in the way—at least she thought it did. While working as a nurse at UCLA Medical Center, she took her first writing course through the Extension program. After the birth of her second child, she returned to college and earned bachelor's and master's degrees. While teaching English as a Second Language, she had an inspiration: if her students could leave everything and start a new life, so could she.

Through Amnesty International, Debra learned about the many dehydration deaths suffered



by those crossing the desert seeking to enter the United States. She visited the Terminal Island Detention Center, which was like a prison for immigration cases. She also participated in the Desert Links program where she spoke to people on both sides of the border including INS agents, immigrants, and relief workers. She visited Terrace Park Cemetery in Holtville, California, which includes graves of undocumented (and sometimes unidentified) migrants. She met Father Richard Estrada who established water stations (now the Border Angels program) with water placed in boxes marked with blue flags for those crossing the desert.

These experiences were seeds planted in her heart, her soul, and her soil. She began writing a novel from the viewpoint of a white woman. But after she began novel writing courses from author Gayle Brandeis, she decided the story needed to be told from the viewpoint of a young Mexican immigrant, Alma, and her daughter, Luz, which means "light." After many attempts to get *Luz* published, She Writes Press published the book in 2020. It has received many positive reviews and was read by the Rotary Club of Ventura book club. *Luz* won the Sarton Award for Contemporary Fiction, named for Mary Sarton, author of a favorite book of Debra's, *Journal of a Solitude*.

Debra's second novel, *Josie and Vic*, tells the story of a man who loses his wife and children in a tragic accident, and is joined by his sister. Together they struggle to rebuild their lives. It will be published April 2023. Debra is now working on her third novel, which follows the life of Ellie, the rebellious daughter in *Josie and Vic* who is now an adult.

Debra's philosophy is "It is better to light a candle than curse the darkness." There is always a light if you are brave enough to see it.
