LORELLE DAWES, VUSD EXPANDED LEARNING




Dr. Lorelle Dawes, Director of Expanded Learning for Ventura Unified School District, addressed the club at our meeting January 17, 2024. She is the daughter of Carol Dawes, who joined us at the meeting, and recently deceased club member Larry Dawes. Lorelle is known to many Ventura families for teaching thousands of kids to swim at the Concord Pool, and for hosting the "Talk to Me" program on channel 15. She also taught adult and continuing education, was principal of Cabrillo Middle School, and an Assistant Principal at Ventura High School. Lorelle currently leads after school programs for nearly 2,000 students at 23 sites.

The programs serve primarily "unduplicated pupils," meaning those who are homeless, in foster care, eligible for free or reduced price

meals, and English learners. A goal is to give opportunities to these kids that more affluent students would have. The program is open to other students at schools where space is available.

The program offers a great variety of activities. A few are: teaching kids to swim at the Kimball pool, teaching them to ride a bike, visiting the botanical gardens, outside enrichment classes such as art lessons and music, surf camp, camping, Impossible Science, and the "STEM to stern" rowing program at Lake Casitas. Female skateboarders from the X Games recently addressed participants about combining fierce competition at the games with support for each other outside the games. The program is remodeling the old Boys & Girls Club facility on Olive Street to be an Expanded Learning hub. The program seeks volunteers to teach about their careers or passions.

Doug Halter gave his monthly report on the City Council, highlighting the Fire Department and storms. Twenty years ago, Fire responded to 8,000 calls per year. Now, with the same size staff, it handles 18,500 calls. The city is establishing a new temporary fire station in the Pierpont area to reduce response times. It has also created Medical-only units to respond to medical calls when firefighting equipment is not needed. Doug also discussed sand management following storms to restore beaches.

Jan. 24 lunch meeting: Congressman Salud Carbajal. Rep. Salud Carbajal represents California's 24th congressional district, a stretch of the central coast encompassing Santa Barbara County and portions of San Luis Obispo County and Ventura County, including almost all of the City of Ventura.

First elected to Congress in 2016, Congressman Carbajal's life experiences have helped him advocate for the needs of his constituents by fighting for veterans' services, environmental protections, economic opportunities for working families, improvements to our immigration system, and commonsense fixes to lower the cost of living on the Central Coast.



Since 2021, Congressman Carbajal has served as the top Democrat on the House Committee on Transportation and Infrastructure's Subcommittee on Coast Guard and Maritime Transportation. He also serves on the House Committees on Armed Services and Agriculture.

In his past term, President Biden signed into law multiple bills written by Congressman Carbajal, including bills to respond to the 2019 *Conception* boat fire of the Central Coast and another written in response to the 2016 shooting in Isla Vista, a measure aimed at expanding the use of 'red flag' laws. That bill was included in last summer's gun safety package – the first federal gun safety law approved by Congress in thirty years.

Prior to his election to Congress, Salud served on the Santa Barbara County Board of Supervisors from 2004 to 2016, where he worked on initiatives to protect California's environment, promote clean energy and sustainability, strengthen schools, and improve public health and safety.

Salud Carbajal rose from humble beginnings after emigrating from Mexico to the United States when he was 5 years old. Salud applied himself in school while working summers as a farmworker, eventually earning a bachelor's degree from the University of California at Santa Barbara (UCSB) and a master's degree in Organizational Management from the Fielding University.

Congressman Carbajal also served eight years in the United States Marine Corps Reserve, including active duty service during the Gulf War in 1992 where he was mobilized to Jacksonville, North Carolina.

He and his wife Gina are the proud parents of two, and currently reside in Goleta, California. (Biography provided by Rep Carbajal)
