When Jacquelyn moved back to Ventura County in January 2022, Scarlett gave her the opportunity to open a local chapter of this global charity. The Ronald McDonald Family Room at Ventura County Medical Center opened its doors in September 2022 and served over 100 families in its first couple of months. With Jacquelyn's



experience in perseverance and starting from the ground up, she is working hard and has big plans for the future.

Club member and board director **Joslynn Jarrett-Skelton** was interviewed by **Beverly Ward.** First of all, her name is not spelled "Skeleton" (like the bones), but "Skelton" (like comedian Red Skelton, with whom she might be distantly related). Joslynn grew up in Bakersfield, which has a lot of great restaurants that serve food like peanut butter pie and taffy, which will definitely not leave anyone looking like a skeleton.


In the eighth grade, Joslynn and her best friend competed for the role of Dorothy in a production of The Wizard of Oz. Joslynn figured she had "paid her dues" playing smaller parts, and was sure she would now get the lead. Her mother dreaded the fallout between the two girls if either won. Instead, both were cast as "the tornado," wearing funny hats and spinning Dorothy above their heads. After the initial disappointment, Joslynn told her friend, "I'd rather be a tornado with you than be Dorothy by myself."

Joslynn attended "every college you can imagine," including Azusa Pacific, Cuesta College, and Cal State Bakersfield. She also had "every major," including public policy, accounting, and American Sign Language. While in college, Joslynn worked as an underwriter. She was then hired as a receptionist but was fired the first day, along with all the other employees, because the company discovered the boss had been embezzling. Based on Joslynn's accounting background, she was kept on to figure out what the boss had done. This led to her promotion to area sales manager.

Joslynn then became the youngest executive director of the YMCA in Bakersfield. (She said that being an executive director is a terrible job, which caused a stir in the audience from Rotarians who have held that position.) (continued next page)

Joslynn had four children, starting in her 20s, and continuing into her 30s and 40s. She shared photographs of each of these periods. Her oldest daughter played Roxie Hart in a production of Chicago, and wore the same dress Joslynn had worn years earlier when she played the same role. Another daughter was born with a congenital heart defect—the left side of her heart was missing. She underwent open heart surgery at Children's Hospital Los Angeles and will now be a spokesperson for Ronald McDonald House. It is Joslynn's life passion to promote healthy living and decrease stroke and heart disease in men, women, and children.
