Ron Bamieh: Gangs and the Death Penalty

After graduating from law school, Ron was awarded a Presidential Appointment, and worked for George Herbert Walker Bush Whitehouse staff in 1991. In January of 1992 Ron was appointed to the United States DepartmentofJusticeasAssistant Chief Deputy. He tried cases in the Federal Court on behalf of the federal government.

In 1993, Ron joined the Ventura County District Attorney's Office and became one of the youngest attorneys ever promoted to

Senior Deputy District Attorney. In 1997, Ron took on an unsolved murder case of a woman who had disappeared in 1992. Through the use of innovative techniques, Ron solved the case and convicted the perpetrator, who is now on California's Death Row. (People v. Justin Merriman). Ron and his investigator were featured on NBC's Dateline Show during a one hour broadcast. While at the District Attorney's office Ron tried numerous felony cases, and was known as the prosecutor who never lost a felony case, including 9 murder trials.

In December 2002, Ron founded Bamieh & Erickson with his good friend Philip Erickson (1959-2005). Under Ron's leadership, Bamieh & Erickson has developed a practice handling personal injury cases, as well as criminal defense cases. The firm represents interests in some of Ventura and Santa Barbara County's most high profile cases. In 2003, the Pacific Coast Business Times named Ron as one of the "40 Under 40" top businessmen in Ventura County. In January of 2004, Ron was given a positive image award by Baseballers against Drugs. In 2007 Bamieh and Erickson, PLC was named small



business of the year by Ventura's Chamber of Commerce. In 2011, the Ventura County Criminal Bar Association awarded Ron the **Richard Erwin Award as Ventura** County Defense Attorney of the Year. The award symbolizes excellence in advocacy and a dedication to clients. Ron is now the only individual in Ventura County history to be named both Prosecutor of the Year (1996, 2000) and Defense Attorney of the Year (2011). In 2013 Ron was one named a "Super lawyer" by the California Lawyer, a

distinction given to the top 5% lawyers in the State. Ron is believed to be the only lawyer in Ventura County's History to have successfully defended 8 consecutive murder cases.

Ron has been a volunteer mock trial coach for the 18 out of the last 20 years, recently ending his tenure as La Reina High School's mock trial coach when his daughter graduated in May 2014. At La Reina, Ron mock trial teams won three consecutive state championships, two world mock trial titles, and finished second in the nation in 2013. He was a board member of Big Brothers/Big Sisters, he was on the Board of the Rubicon Theater, and he is member of Downtown Rotary and the Ventura Chamber of Commerce. Ron is also a key fundraiser for the Children's Cancer and Blood Disease Program and Children's Resource Library at the Ventura County Hospital, which named after Ron and Jennifer's daughter Remy (2000-05).

Ron and his wife, Jennifer, and their three children reside in Ventura.

President Rob's Corner

Nigerian business leader and philanthropist Sir Emeka Offor announced a \$1 million gift to The Rotary Foundation for polio eradication efforts at the Rotary Convention in Sydney.

Sir Emeka, who is executive vice chair of the Chrome Group, has made contributions to Rotary's campaign to rid the world of this deadly disease totaling more than \$3.1 million, including a \$1 million gift he announced at the 2013 convention. He told the attendees that his commitment to ending polio is a personal one. "Scores of my friends and classmates fell victim to this dreaded disease," said Sir Emeka, a member of the Rotary Club of Awka GRA who serves as Rotary's PolioPlus ambassador in Nigeria. "As a young man I vowed that I would someday do something significant to end polio in Nigeria."

Sir Emeka told the crowd he recently opened a PolioPlus Ambassador's Office, at no cost to Rotary, in Abuja. The office serves as a hub for his ambassadorial activities and supports the work of the Nigeria PolioPlus Committee.

Nigeria, Afghanistan, and Pakistan are the only countries where polio has never been stopped. Despite tremendous progress — only two documented cases of polio reported in the last 12 months — Offor says the country still faces unprecedented insecurity and inaccessibility in a number of northern states.

"The Nigerian government, now supported by the international community, is doing all that it can to eliminate the widespread violence, abductions, and terrorism," he says. "Peace would facilitate polio eradication, but we cannot sit by and wait until that time comes. We must do what we can to find ways to end polio now."
