Kristin Taylor, in her Rotary moment, recalled traipsing down a dirt path in South Africa where she came upon a one-room classroom and saw the Rotary logo over the door. She would discover that this was one of 150 classrooms built by a single Rotary Club! Ultimately this club, from 1977 to 1997 would build some 2500 classrooms.

Greg Kincaid awarded Juan Soto a Julius Gius Foundation Award. President Indy asked President-elect Irene Henry to officiate in the induction of Daniel Saltee, who joins the club with the designation of Architecture. Daniel was sponsored by Curtis Cormane.

Program

The speaker was club member Hank Chandler. To put his topic in perspective, Hank first spoke of his background. He was born in north-central Texas, where his grandfather was a real western guy, and Hank grew to love the lifestyle in his environment and reading a lot of westerns. He would move his way west, settling in this area were he worked in the Sheriffs department and achieve his masters degree.

Hank spoke mostly of one of California's most notorious outlaws, Joaquin Murrieta. Hank painted a picture of the difficult life in California in 1850s where day to day life was tough and one had to be self sufficient. The landscape here was mostly scattered ranchos until the gold discoveries throughout the state, even here in Ventura County. It was in this chaotic time that outlaws appeared to take advantage of Spanish settlers and Chinese immigrants. This time also saw the rise of vigilante groups because of corrupt law enforcement and general lawlessness of the time.

There is a lot of myth surrounding Joaquin Murrieta and the full truth may never be known. He was either born in



Sonora or Chile. He is considered а Mexican hero, a Robin Hood-type or murderous a criminal. He was a noble Mexican landowner or an opportunist. Hs brother was possibly lynched by miners and his wife raped.

Some facts are clear. He came to CA in 1850s.

He had been thru Ventura several times and had formed a gang called the Five Joaquins. This gang was responsible for the majority of murders and robberies in the Mother Lode country. He stole over \$100,000 in gold and robbed stagecoaches. He killed 19 people, mostly Chinese immigrant workers and stole over 100 horses. He even attacked a schooner near Stockton for gold. His gang killed three lawmen.

By May 1853 the situation had gotten so bad that the governor created the California State Rangers: their only charge was to catch Murrieta. Some 50 rangers were dispatched statewide. On 25 July 1853 at Monterey, two of the gang were killed including Murrieta and Three-fingered Jack. The head of Murrieta was preserved as evidence for the governor to collect a sizeable reward.
