He began by recounting the many Rotarians whom he has known for the past 45 years in Ventura. Korea has 5,000-year history. *We in the U.S. want freedom; they want a Leader*. Korea is a peninsula off Manchuria that was partitioned after WWII. The Allies put Kim IL Jong in power then. The Korean War (Conflict?) began in 1950. It concluded with a truce in 1953, but as there was never an armistice, we are still technically at war. Korea was another example of drawing the lines of the Cold War: the Berlin Wall, Cuban Missile Crisis, Vietnam.

Dr. Mel went first to Chonju, South Korea, in 1985 as a visiting professor of neurosurgery at the invitation of the Rev. Billy Graham and son Franklin. They also invited the family to Berlin in 1989 to witness the fall of the Berlin Wall, which prefaced the fall of Communism in 1991. The Cheathams, via Rev. Graham, met many times with Gorbachov. In 1994 the DPRK launched a nuclear development program.

Billy Graham, who got on well with Kim IL Jong, invited the Cheathams to North Korea. Kim IL Jong died in '96, however he was declared President for Eternity. Mel showed slides of Pyongyang in those early days that showed great public places with no cars or people. There are said to be one million land mines in the DMZ. Everything is about the military. There is a tunnel beneath the DMZ, that Mel has seen, through which 35,000 soldiers can be moved to the South in an hour. Every year there is a great national celebration. 100,000 performers make no mistakes! Translate this discipline to a military operation and you have an idea the danger the DPRK represents. Mel recommended we read Escape from Camp 14 to better understand conditions there. His son, Kim Jong IL, succeeded Kim. Things began to change. Everything you see is a facade, like a Hollywood stage. Recently, Dr. Mel worked in 700-bed hospital north of the Yalu River with no water or electricity, yet every bed was full. Dr. Mel and the Samaritan's Purse work closely with US agencies. Communication is very circumscribed. Every word is recorded and likely filmed. Now the 29-year old Supreme Commander, Kim Jong UN, grandson of the President for Eternity, rules the DPRK. The DPRK is totally food dependent. Six million out of 24 million North Koreans are at risk of starvation. The general population subsists on 400-600 calories a day. In February there was an agreement to suspend uranium enrichment and nuclear long-range missile tests in exchange for food relief. Six weeks later a missile was launched.

What next re: food, military and reunification? He said to expect another weapons test, which means big trouble. Even China has issued warnings. It would cost \$14.3 trillion to unify the Peninsula. Children are starving yet there is money to pay for the military. Dr. Mel said the best hope is to keep America both morally and physically strong.
