

CASA of Ventura County

Our speaker today is Miriam Mack. She joined CASA of Ventura County in 2012, a year after the 27 year-old program became an independent non-profit organization.

CASA trains community volunteers to become sworn officers of the Court who then advocate for the best interests of a foster child appointed to the program by the Juvenile Dependency Judge. "Children in the foster care system need a constant adult presence to advocate for them until a permanent home can be found.

Of all that our Advocates do, being present for the child is our most important role." Miriam's goal is to grow the organization from one that serves 200 of the needlest children, to one that can assign a trained volunteer to each of the 1,200 children in the system.

Before joining CASA, Miriam worked in economic development and redevelopment for the cities of Ventura, Culver City and Santa Monica. She graduated from UCLA with a B.A. and UCSB with a M.A. in Economics. Throughout her many years of long commutes, she and her husband, Darryl, continued to live in Ventura where they raised their two children.

Thousands of child abuse reports are made in Ventura County each year. Many of these children enter the foster care system. Once this occurs, the dependency court judge appoints the most severely affected of these children to the CASA program.

CASA is a unique non profit organization which recruits, screens and trains community volunteers to become the voices of these children who find themselves in court through no fault of their own.



Ventura County CASA has existed since 1985 when a group of concerned judges, attorneys and community members felt that objective, caring, support for these children during court proceedings and out of home placement was necessary. The CASA advocate, as an officer of the court, is the eyes and ears of the court, reporting to the judge and attorneys the child's progress and needs.

A Court Appointed Special Advocate: (CASA) is an ordinary person doing

extraordinary things. CASA volunteers come from all walks of life but they have many things in common:

- They care about at-risk children and want to help them. They are responsible adults who demonstrate objectivity and commitment
- They are willing to give 10-15 hours each month
- They enjoy a sense of fulfillment knowing that they are making a positive, lasting difference

Becoming a CASA Advocate involves:

- · an interview and thorough background checks
- completion of 30 hours of training
- agreeing to 12 months of service to a court dependent child

Program

The speaker was Dr. Robert Dodge, a family physician practicing full time in Ventura. He serves on the board of Physicians for Social Responsibility which was the recipient of the 1985 Nobel Peace Prize.

Dr. Dodge spoke of the continuing peril of thousands of nuclear warheads held by nations of the world. He demonstrated the probable impacts of even a 'limited' conflict of a couple of hundred nuclear weapons on the world's fragile climate. The resulting climate change could eventually wipe out hundreds of millions of people through starvation.

He urged club members to become involved in reducing the global nuclear threat, such as supporting Rotary Action for Peace;s initiatives.



We want you to join us for World Polio Day on October 24. How? Rotary will host a live-streamed global status update on the fight to end polio. Guests include Global Polio Eradication Initiative partners, celebrity ambassadors, polio survivors, and Rotary members. Today, the vast majority of the world is polio-free. Nearly 80 percent of all polio cases are concentrated in just one country: Pakistan. The two other remaining polio-endemic countries - Afghanistan and Nigeria - continue to show progress. Nigeria has decreased polio cases by 87 percent and Afghanistan has recorded only 10 cases of this devastating disease.


