It states that the first meeting of the club was Wednesday, June 12, 1918, at the Hotel De Leon. The meeting time was designated as, and has remained as, Wednesdays at noon.

Hotel De Leon was at the northwest corner of Chestnut and Main Streets (current location of Dargan's Irish Pub). At one point, it was known as the Hotel Rose. It was one of several large hotels in downtown Ventura in that era, including the Anacapa Hotel and the Hotel Ventura. The De Leon was built in 1889 and demolished in 1933.

#### PROGRAM—LYSA URBAN—WOMEN'S ECONOMIC VENTURES





Lysa Urban, Marketing Manager of Women's Economic Ventures (WEV), gave a presentation at our meeting October 19, 2022. WEV was founded in 1951 to assist women realize their dreams, achieve financial independence, and succeed on their own terms. Although the focus is on women, WEV assists individuals of all genders.

The three core activities of WEV are: business training, funding, and consulting. It offers six-week financial literacy programs in English and Spanish, and recently conducted the program in Mixteco. Financial assistance is given in the form of forgivable loans up to \$10,000 to entrepreneurs who would be unable to get a loan at a bank. Consulting is provided for long-term advisory support, plus short-term "deep dives" into particular topics.

WEV serves Ventura and Santa Barbara Counties. It is part of the National Network of Women's Business Centers and can refer out-of-county individuals to other groups within the network.

Eighty-seven percent of those WEV has assisted move out of poverty. Every \$1 invested by WEV returns \$15 to the local community. Rotary has obtained grants to assist WEV. A number of club members support WEV through the League of Extraordinary Women and Men.

## High School Scholarships for girls in Kazungula, Zambia

The Grace Centre is an initiative in Kazungula, Zambia which is being supported by a Rotary Global Grant # 1866010. This is the global grant that our club is international host. The goal of the Grace Centre is to help young women at risk for sexual exploitation and early marriage by training them in vocations where they can find employment—computer work, tailoring, and food preparation.

About 80% of girls in Zambia are currently unemployed. There are 2 contributing factors—a lack of training in an employable skill, and a lack of secondary school education. The costs associated with secondary schooling is beyond the means of most families, and if funding is possible, boys are the priority. Many of the girls at *The Grace Centre* could finish high school if funds were available.

While the Rotary Global Grant will provide the critical skills training, school fees are not allowed as part of the grant. Therefore, we are seeking individual and Rotary Club donations for the sponsorships.

The Grace Centre will be managed by an established NGO called The Lushomo Trust. The Grace Centre Working Committee is comprised of Lushomo Trust board members, and guidance counselors/teachers from local schools. They will approve applicants based on their financial need, aptitude, and desire for future studies.

For 2023, we have two options for school support: Kazungula Boarding School at \$580.00 US dollars and Riverview Day School at \$325.00 US dollars. A yearly sponsorship includes textbooks, materials, two school uniforms, PTA fees, and administrative fees, shoes and some meals.

Through this and other SEEAG programs including Farm Day in Ventura and Santa Barbara counties, over 65,000 elementary school students and community members in Southern California have increased their understanding of the food journey.
