#### DISTRICT GOVERNOR MARTA GOLDING BROWN



We were honored this week by a visit from District Governor Marta Golding Brown. A reception for Marta was held at the Portside Clubhouse Tuesday evening, October 3. Wednesday morning, she met with our board members to discuss goals. She was the speaker at our Wednesday lunch meeting.

Marta discussed her background as an exchange student in Japan. She joined Lancaster Sunrise Rotary in 2005 where she served two terms as club president. She participated in a Rotary professional exchange in Rio, where she saw first-hand armed guards at a school to ensure the safety of the students. She joined the Oxnard Rotary Club in 2015.

Marta's theme for the year is "Let's Have Fun." She explained that members will participate if it brings them pleasure.

The Rotary International theme this year is "Create Hope in the World." One priority is mental health. Each chapter should have a mental health initiative. Another priority is polio, with our goal of total global eradication close at hand. Maui Relief is ongoing, with Rotary support committed for the long haul to rebuild.


For the 2022-2023 Rotary Year, the Rotary Foundation raised more that \$427 million. We funded more than 1,100 global grants, 470 district grants, and 310 disaster response grants.

Marta discussed the upcoming district conference October 20-21 in Bakersfield. It will include a class on grants, a hospitality suite, wine tasting, and the opportunity to socialize and engage.

Marta is co-founder and CEO of Smart Coast California, which supports property rights in coastal communities. She lives in Ventura with her husband Forrest. Their daughter MacKenzie lives in Colorado.



#### ASSEMBLYMEMBER STEVE BENNETT



On the evening of September 28, 2023, club members met at the VUSD District Office with Steve Bennett, Assemblymember for the 38th Assembly District, which represents the western part of Ventura County. Nineteen members and guests attended. He was introduced by club member Doug Halter.

Steve was a high school teacher first. He served on the Ventura City Council 1993-1997. He then served on the County Board of Supervisors 2001-2020, and was elected to the state Assembly in 2020.

Steve is considered the "father" of SOAR, which guarantees urban curbs around the city and county. He helped the AIDS Partnership. He was instrumental as a County Supervisor to ensure Ventura County had budget reserves after having a few years of no reserve monies.

Steve appreciates service organizations like Rotary as they make cities different and give a sense of community.

Steve talked about the state budget with its giant fluctuations as the stock market goes up and down. California is the 4th largest economy in the world. He explained that transit is the biggest threat to the California budget. Transit is mostly managed at a local level, and the transportation budgets are all in the red. He has asked the Legislative Analyst's Office to frame the issues.

Steve does not plan to run for reelection as he would then be in his 80's so he feels he is able to take risks and take on the bullies in state government. He wants to take on the "sacred cows" of state government which are:

Sacred cow #1: Ground water – overdrafting of sources. We have 44 water basins in California. Half of critical basins did not have sufficient supplies. Canadian pension funds have bought land in Central California, pulled out olive trees, and put in almond trees which use more water.

Sacred cow #2: Carbon to carbonless economy. Battery technology is important and should have to compete with hydrogen. Hydrogen could be used for ships and heavy trucks.

Sacred cow #3: Transparency in government. Steve wants a culture of making decisions to create good government.

Sacred cow #4: Housing. Growing income inequality is destroying society and hollowing out the middle class. There is no shortage of housing, but not enough housing people can afford. Until we address it at the federal level, it will be a patchwork solution. He wants to reign in abuse from local developers. He would like school districts and corporations to build their own affordable housing for their workforce. Short term rentals should be limited because they convert available housing into tourist stays and prohibit workers from living in the neighborhoods where they work.

- Privacy and Consumer Protection. This committee spans a wide range of technology-related issues, and includes matters affecting consumer protection in both the digital and analog worlds. It has jurisdiction over the protection of digital information and other personal information, the security of data, and information technology, as well as false advertising, charitable solicitations, weights and measures, and consumer protection generally. It is also responsible for oversight of the Department of Technology within the State's Government Operations Agency.
- Water, Parks, and Wildlife Committee: Jurisdiction includes water resources, flood management, fish and game, parks and recreation, and wildlife.

Steve serves on these Subcommittees:

- Chair, Budget Subcommittee No. 3 on Climate Crisis, Resources, Energy, and Transportation.
- Member, Budget Subcommittee No. 6 on Budget Process, Oversight and Program Evaluation.

Select Committees: Nonprofit Sector; Offshore Wind Energy in California; Sea Level Rise and the California Economy.

Joint Committees: Fisheries and Aquaculture; Legislative Budget.
