PROGRAM: CONVERSATIONS IN ROTARY

Lynda Girtsman interviewed two members: **Keith Moschetto** and **Aaron Campbell**. Lynda is like our own Barbara Walters (except unlike Barbara, Lynda doesn't try to make them cry)!



Keith Moschetto has many interests. He loves traveling, reading (especially biographies and autobiographies), riding his Harley, and, of course, Rotary.

Keith's career did not end up where he expected. He attended Buena High School, received an AA from Ventura College, and then trained to become a firefighter. But while waiting tables at the Gin Mill, he

became friendly with a regular customer who was an executive at Getty Oil. He persuaded Keith that he could make double the money at Getty than he would make as a firefighter. So in 1980, Keith went to work for Getty.

In the 1950s and '60s, oil workers were grizzled World War II vets who were deaf in one ear and had missing fingers. But by the 1980s and '90s, the work force became more civilized and more women joined the ranks.

In the 1990s, Texaco paid for Keith's continuing education. He earned a degree in Finance from Cal State Northridge, and an MBA from the University of Laverne. He worked for Prudential Realty from the ages of 48 to 54, then received a very generous offer to return to the oil and gas industry in 2013. Over the years, Keith held a variety of jobs in the oil industry, including as a roustabout, on oil rigs and offshore platforms, in geology, and permitting. Much of his work was with emergency response, including reporting and cleaning up spills. He explained that most of the spills were very small, like a few ounces of hydraulic fluid, and much of the oil you see on the ocean is natural seepage.

Keith's mother died when he was 10. His grandmother was a role model. She was unusual in that she was an executive for Nestle in the 1930s and a single mother. She impressed on Keith to never feel like a victim, but to keep moving forward.

Keith got married at the Victorian Rose Wedding Chapel. He is widowed and raised his son Brandon alone from the age of 7. His advice on raising teenagers: spend 80% of your time listening, and 20% giving advice. Let them figure out their own solutions.

Keith has traveled a lot recently. His next trip is to the East Coast to see the fall colors and visit family. After that—a safari to Kenya!

CONVERSATIONS IN ROTARY, CONTINUED

Lynda then interviewed **Aaron**Campbell. Making art is an important part of Aaron's life. He feels it is all about the process, not the outcome. As you start a piece you don't necessarily know where it will end up. He recently painted portraits of two friends, and a self-portrait.

Aaron lives in Newbury Park and is the Director of Development at the Ventura Botanical Gardens. He has two boys.



Aaron was born in Illinois. He attended four high schools in three states. His only regret in life is that he turned down a high school program at the Milwaukee Institute of Art. (Just one regret...that's pretty good!) Making art is the only thing that kept him in high school. He went to college in Milwaukee, then moved to Berkeley, then attended Santa Monica College. He graduated from UCLA "as an older student" (he seems young to me!) with a degree in History and a minor in Urban Planning.

Aaron worked briefly at the Huntington Library, then for seven years at the California Institute of the Arts (Cal Arts) before coming to the Ventura Botanical Gardens.

His profession is fundraising. Lynda asked how he gets people to come to events when they know they will be asked to give money. He said it is about philanthropy—literally, the love of humans. We give in many forms including money, time, and expertise. We can do more together than as individuals.

Aaron has been rock climbing for two and half years. That includes bouldering and climbing with a partner, where you trust the other person to pull you up, and to catch you when you fall. He enjoys Boulderdash climbing gym.
