From the Governor: Membership key to Rotary success

When PRIP Ray Klinginsmith was asked recently for advice about how to build the Foundation, his considered answer was, "Membership! —If you don't have members, they won't give to the Foundation." This is a succinct answer to the challenge we face in Rotary. We are Rotarians because we like what Rotary offers: fellowship, networking, service, and sometimes even good food. If we want this "good thing" to continue, to make its benefits available to more people, we need to spread the word.

We need to recruit, but we also need to keep our present Rotarians.

District Executive Secretary John Last recently prepared a report on membership numbers for our District. The report is dismal with regard to the fact that membership in our district is down by 51 members since July 1. Twenty-one of our clubs have experienced a membership decline ranging from the loss of one member to the loss of 11 members. Ten clubs have experienced growth, ranging from one to six new members. Leading that increase are the Storm Lake and Mason City Sunrise clubs.

We also know numbers are only a part of the story: One club lost nine members, for example, and gained back six, so the club's overall loss of three members really represents a lot of effort to regain ground. And I recognize that many of you are making splendid efforts to maintain and to raise your membership numbers.

The responsibility of maintaining and growing membership rests with all of us—not just the membership chair or the president. If you care about what Rotary does for you, your business, your community, and your world, you need to care about recruiting and sustaining membership. Take a look at the membership in your own club. Make sure you know why members are leaving. If it's for any other reasons than job transfers or death, you need to evaluate what you are doing. Do you have a welcoming environment, opportunities for members, fellowship, and fun? Then look around your community for people who could benefit by being a Rotarian. If each club could have a net growth of +1 member each year, we will overcome this challenge.

Terry Dahlquist (district membership chair, Waverly), your assistant governors, and your district leadership all are here to support you. Make membership your board's #1 priority in the next months. Without you and your efforts, Rotary will become road kill, and the world, in turn, will be a lesser place.



Task Force Team will visit Brazil this May

A Task Force Team from District 5970 will visit District 4590 in Brazil at the end of May with the purpose of developing and cementing relationships between Districts 5970 and 4590 to plan future projects and continue Rotary's good works.

The visit resulted from connections made over the past couple of years with the Brazilian district.

The team will work toward setting up a structure to facilitate future projects and exchanges between the two districts. Possible future projects are aimed at developing Global Grant Projects to create opportunities for multi-district – multi-club involvement.

In addition, the Task Force Team expects to deliberately propose future exchanges for Vocational Training Teams, Friendship Exchanges, Youth Exchanges, and exchanges with Interact and Rotaract clubs in both districts.

The group will travel to Brazil on May 22, arriving in time to present a program at District 4590's District Conference and share the vision of future work between the districts. Future leadership opportunities for Rotarians in both districts will be plentiful, as the effort will require the help of many to carry out future work and to build these relationships.
