



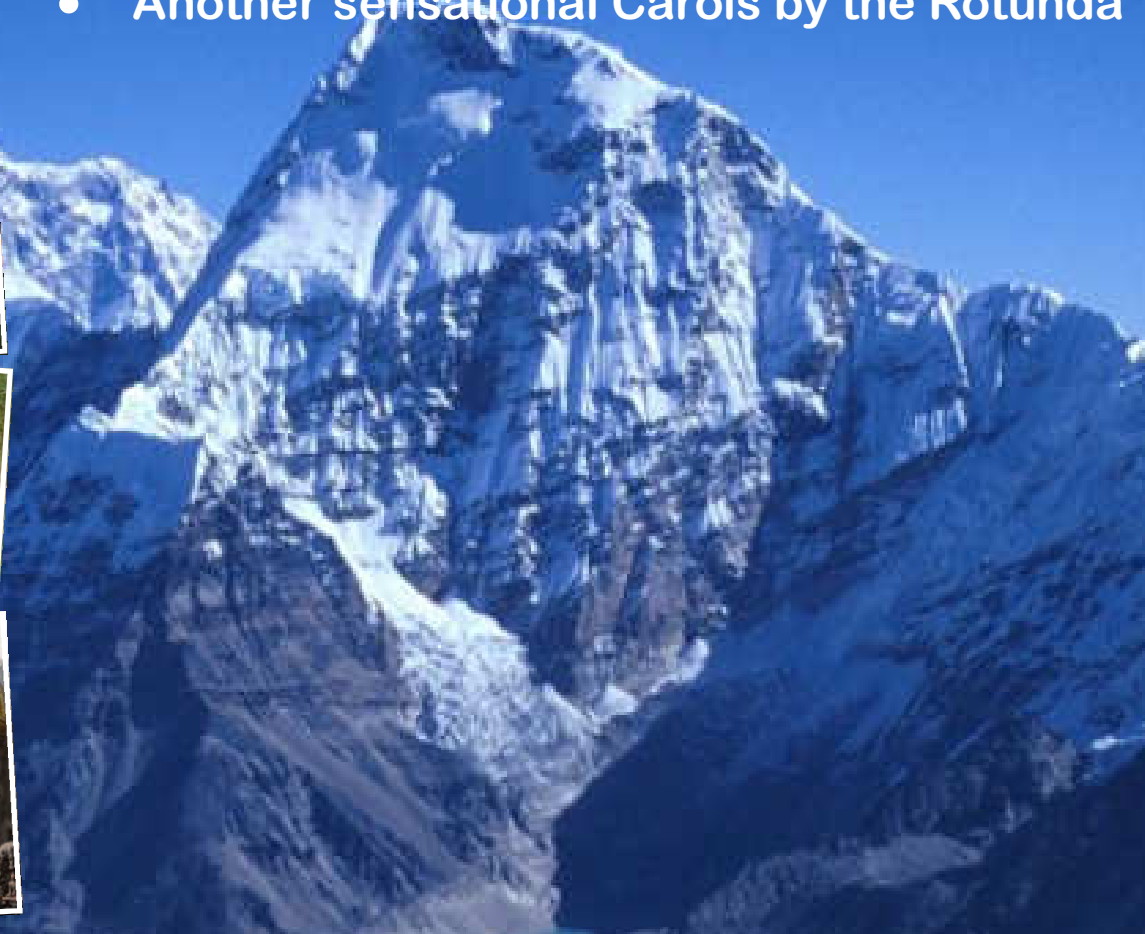

Making a Difference in Nepal

David Rusk, from the Rotary Club of Brownhill Creek, has an unwavering passion for the people of Nepal. The retired school principal recently led a group of Rotarians and their partners on a Rotary Friendship Exchange to this amazing country.

Whilst this was David's fourth trip to Nepal, it was a new and challenging experience for most of the touring party, who were hosted by members of the Rotary Club of Dillibazar, with whom the Brownhill Creek club has developed a sister club relationship. Kathmandu is very confronting, with much poverty, poor sanitation, persistent smog and deteriorating infrastructure.

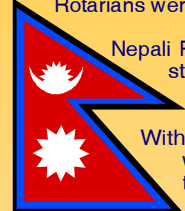
The group arrived during the festive season of Tihar and shared in the celebrations and observed temples and rituals associated with the Hindu and Buddhist religions.

With Rotary's support, there are some dedicated people making a significant difference in running schools and orphanages, including a group of Nepali teachers who had previously been sponsored to visit Adelaide to learn from our Australian teaching practices. While in Nepal, David conducted a workshop for 270 local principals on school management & strategic planning issues.

Rotarian sponsorship to the tune of \$180.00 per year is making a tangible difference to the school life of a number of local students, and a number of the visiting Rotarians were able to meet up with their sponsored students.



Nepali Rotarian, Prem Oli, founded the Blue Sky Public School in 1996, which now has 300 students and staff. Despite the challenging conditions students are immaculately dressed, constantly smiling and the population dance and sing at any celebration and their clothing is most colourful at festival times.

With the assistance of a Rotary Foundation Humanitarian Grant, the Rotary Club of Brownhill Creek supplied the school with a number of whiteboards and pin up boards, all of which were locally manufactured. David will be taking a group of students from Pulteney Grammar School to visit Blue Sky Public School in October, 2012. There are also more Rotarians from Dillibazar who would like to visit Adelaide on a Friendship Exchange in the future. His next project is to raise \$130,000 to erect a school at an Orphanage for Dalit (Untouchable) children.

The Rotary Club of Brownhill Creek has recently inducted **Tony Ogbeide**. Tony was born in Nigeria in 1963, the first of 11 children, and migrated to Australia in 2003. He has worked in management positions in agribusiness and livestock industries in Nigeria and Australia, and also in the rubber industry with the Nigeria based Michelin Plantation Group as a senior manager. During his PhD studies at the University of Adelaide, he worked with the department of Immigration and citizenship and the Australia Taxation Office here in Adelaide. Tony has several qualifications including two Master degrees in Agribusiness and Business Administration, and is a member of the Nigerian Institute of Management.



Rotary arrived in Nigeria some 40 years ago and has since spread to all the states and cities in Nigeria. Tony is a former member of the Rotary Club of Oregbeni. The contributions of Rotary in Nigeria are numerous and diverse at local and international level. It has been in the fore front in the polio eradication campaign in Nigeria. It is involved in the provision of portable water supply to communities and building future leaders through assistance in the formation of Rotaract Clubs in educational institutions. Other contributions include provision of traffic signs, wheel chairs and other mobility aids to disabled persons, donation of domestic/food items to charity and orphanage homes, building of Bus-stop and provision of scholarship to indigent scholars.

"I personally enjoy two things about Rotary...", says Tony, *"The services it renders to humanity and the fellowship amongst members. It provides a forum to interact, gain and share experiences that are relevant to self development and to provide services to mankind through financial and intellectual contributions."*

A new "Sensory Garden" at the Repat, thanks to the Mitcham Rotary Club!

When the Rotary Club of Mitcham were approached by Judi Van Onsen, Allied Health Assistant at the Repat, to help with a sensory garden, the first question was, "What is a Sensory Garden?" Judi spoke at the Club and explained the concept was aimed at creating "garden therapy" for Ward 18 patients, who suffer from both psychiatric illness and dementia, often leading to behavioural problems. The club approved a budget for a 3 phases project through discussions with Judi and visits to the site. Phase 1 was the planting of fruit trees, phase 2 was planting masses of colourful plants, many with distinct aromas providing unique sensory stimuli. Rotarian Helen Gooley accompanied Judi on shopping expeditions for each of these phases. Phase 3 was concreting sections of the area to enable wheelchair access. A number of members including Club President Robert Nottage were out concreting on a 40°C day. Tables and chairs will also be purchased and an official opening is planned in March.

The Fight to Eradicate Polio

Thanks to Rotary and its partners, the world has seen polio cases plummet by more than 99 percent, preventing five million instances of child paralysis and 250,000 deaths. When Rotary began its eradication work, polio infected more than 350,000 children annually. In 2009, fewer than 1,700 cases were reported worldwide.

Rotary began immunizing children against polio in 1985 and became a spearheading partner in the Global Polio Eradication Initiative (GPEI) three years later.

Since 1988, Rotary International and its GPEI partners — the World Health Organization, UNICEF, and the U.S. Centres for Disease Control and Prevention — have worked to wipe polio from the face of the earth. A volunteer service organization of 1.2 million men and women, Rotary's main responsibilities are fundraising, advocacy, and volunteer recruitment. To date, Rotary has contributed more than US\$900 million to the polio eradication effort.

With over 33,000 clubs in more than 200 countries and geographical areas, Rotary is able to reach out to national governments worldwide to generate crucial financial and technical support for polio eradication. Since 1995, the advocacy efforts of Rotary and its partners have helped raise more than \$8 billion from donor governments.

The Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation is working closely with Rotary International in the fight to eradicate polio. It recently awarded US\$355 million in challenge grants to Rotary, which has pledged to raise \$200 million in response. The resulting \$555 million will support critically needed polio eradication activities.

Rotary clubs also provide "sweat equity" on the ground in polio-affected communities, which helps ensure that leaders at all levels remain focused on the eradication goal. Rotary club members have volunteered their time and personal resources to reach more than two billion children in 122 countries with the oral polio vaccine.

But the polio cases represented by that final 1 percent are the most difficult and expensive to prevent. Challenges include geographic isolation, worker fatigue, armed conflict, and cultural barriers.

That's why it's so important to generate the funding needed to End Polio Now. To fail is to invite a polio resurgence that would condemn millions of children to lifelong paralysis in the years ahead.

The bottom line is this: As long as polio threatens even one child anywhere in the world, all children — wherever they live — remain at risk.
