

Rotary 4-Way Test Speech Contest 2025 Application Form

CONTEST RULES:

- 1. Contestants must be enrolled MAUHS or Grace Christian students in grades 9-12. Bennington area home schooled students and exchange students are eligible.
- 2. Contestants are not allowed to read their speech. They may use outline notes or deliver their speech partly or entirely from memory. The speech must be between 5 and 7 minutes long. Any shorter or longer and it will be disqualified.
- 3. Each contestant must prepare an original speech that explores all aspects of the Four-Way Test (see next page). The speech should apply the four questions of the Four-Way Test to their own life or a part of society and demonstrate its impact.
- 4. The decisions of the judges are final.
- 5. Contestants must be prepared to attend any additional district contests for which they become eligible.

Cash Prizes include: First Prize \$600 - Second Prize \$300 - Third Prize \$200 Frist Prize winner will be invited to the district contest.

The Rotary Four Way Test of the things we think, say, or do:

- 1. Is it the TRUTH?
- 2. Is it FAIR to all concerned?
- 3. Will it build GOODWILL and BETTER FRIENDSHIPS?
- 4. Will it be BENEFICIAL to all concerned?

Helpful hints:

Start by choosing an idea or experience that connects to the Four Way Test.

- Introduce the topic of your speech clearly.
- Develop your ideas using specific examples. Draw from your own experiences real-life examples help make your speech more relatable and implactful.
- Summarize your key points at the end, so the audience knows what they should take away from the speech.
- Avoid memorizing your speech word-for-word, as it can make your delivery sound robotic. Instead, use brief notes (a few key words) on a 3x5 card to keep you on track while staying engaged with your audience.

When delivering your speech:

- Stand tall but relaxed good posture helps with confidence.
- Take a calm breath before you begin. This gives you an opportunity to look at the audience and settle in.
- Pace yourself! Don't rush. Your audience needs time to absorb your message.

Think of it like this: You don't have to rush. The audience is hearing your ideas for the first time, even though they are already clear to you. Think of yourself as a tour guide leading a group through an unfamiliar place. You know the way, but they don't—so you need to walk at a steady pace, pointing out important details along the way. If you rush ahead, they'll get lost. Take your time and guide them through your ideas clearly.

Practice smart:

- Skip the mirror if it makes you feel self-conscious.
- If you practice with others, listen to their feedback but trust your own instincts.
- Time yourself. Your speech must be *between 5 and 7 minutes* outside this range will lead to disqualification.
