Prose vs Poetry

- Prose is a form of <u>language</u> that exhibits a <u>grammatical structure</u> and a <u>natural flow of</u> <u>speech</u> rather than a <u>rhythmic structure</u> (as in traditional <u>poetry</u>).
- The construction of prose, its simplicity and loosely defined structure have led to its adoption in fictional writing.



It's about the length&..

- Flash fiction.................Flash fiction is a style of fictional literature or <u>fiction</u> of extreme brevity.[1] There is no widely accepted definition of the length of the category.
- Some self-described markets for flash fiction impose caps as low as three hundred words, while others consider stories as long as a thousand words to be flash fiction.

Novella and novels

▶ novellaA novella is a written, fictional, prose narrative normally longer than a short story but shorter than a novel. The novella is a common literary genre in several European languages.



It's about the length&..

- A short story is a brief work of <u>literature</u>, usually written in <u>narrative prose</u>.
- A classic definition is that one should be able to read it in one sitting, a point most notably made in Edgar Allan Poe's essay.
- Present day: the term short story most often refers to a work of fiction no shorter than 1,000 and no longer than 20,000 words.

Writing Craft.

- At its most prototypical the short story features a small cast of named characters, and focuses on a self-contained incident with the intent of evoking a "single effect" or mood.[11]
- In doing so, short stories make use of plot, resonance, and other dynamic components to a far greater degree than is typical of an anecdote, yet to a far lesser degree than a novel.
- While the short story is largely distinct from the novel, authors of both generally draw from a common pool of literary techniques.

The writing craft

- NARRATIVE TECHNIQUE: How the writer keeps the story or poem moving; the strategy that shapes it so it is as interesting to the reader as it is the writer.
- PERSONA: The distance between the writer and the story's narrator; the personality of the first, second or third person narrator and its narrative distance from the characters.

The writing craft -

Point of View

Who tells the story, and why? Why is one persona narrator chosen over another (how would *The Great Gatsby* be different if Gatsby told his own story?).

In third person, should be point of view be limited to one or more characters, or omniscient? In first person, why is the story most effectively told from one particular point of view.

The writing craft


- ACTION: How is it used by persona narrator to reveal character, define persona, move story along, seduce reader's interest, develop narrative flow?
- DIALOGUE: How is it used to reveal character and persona narrator?
- SENSE OF TIME/PLACE: How they support narrative flow and reveal character, etc.
 Sometimes Time and Place become characters themselves.

It is not easy

Writing short stories is not easy. A novel is an easier literary form in a way – it allows you the space for character and plot development and gives you the space to slowly fall in love with it

Short story, on the other hand, is like literary speed dating; it only has so much time to set itself apart and make a somewhat decent expression.


The monkey's paw





Structure of a short story. Freytag's pyramid

The traditional architecture of the Western short story is defined by Freytag's Pyramid which sets out the following: exposition (where the setting and main characters are introduced), followed by the rising action (where the conflict is introduced), the climax (the culmination of the highest point in the conflict often the point with the most action) and the falling action resulting in the denouement or resolution where the conflict is resolved.



"Monkey's Paw"by author W. W. **lacobs**

- In this supernatural short story three <u>wishes</u> are granted to the owner of the monkey's paw, but the wishes come with an enormous price for interfering with fate.
- The story involves Mr. and Mrs. White and their adult son, Herbert. Sergeant-Major Morris, a friend of the Whites introduces them to the monkey's paw, telling of its mysterious powers to grant three wishes and of its journey from an old fakir to his comrade, who used his third wish to wish for death.
- Sergeant-Major Morris, having had a bad experience upon using the paw, throws the monkey's paw into the fire but White quickly retrieves it. Morris warns White, but White, thinking about what the paw could be used for, ignores him.


- Mr. White wishes for £300 to be used as the final payment on his house. The next day his son Herbert leaves for work at a local factory. Later that day, word comes to the White home that Herbert has been killed in a machinery accident.
- The firm makes a goodwill payment to heirs of the deceased. The payment is £300.


 Ten days after the funeral, Mrs. White, almost mad with grief, asks her husband to use the paw to wish Herbert back to life. Reluctantly, he does so. There is a knock at the door. Mrs. White fumbles at the locks in an attempt to open the door.
- Mr. White knows, however, that he cannot allow their revived son in, as his appearance will be too hideous. Mr. White was required to identify the body, which had been mutilated by the accident. It has now been buried for more than a week.
- While Mrs. White tries to open the door, Mr. White makes his third wish, and the knocking stops. Mrs. White opens the door to find no one there.



Alice Munro and Jhumpa Lahiri

- Yet there are many successful short storytellers such as Munro herself who do not conform to the traditional structure.
- Jhumpa Lahiri, who won the Pulitzer Prize (1999) for her short story collection titled *Interpreter of Maladies* endings also seem to echo Anton Chekhov's own "subversive endings," as described in David Jauss's essay "Returning Characters to Life: Chekov's Subversive Endings".

The recent award of the Nobel Prize 2013 for Literature to Alice Munro is the ultimate recognition of the short story form.



The ending -- Chekhov

- Virginia Woolf on the unique quality of a Chekhov story in *The Common Reader* (1925) (9)
- "But is it the end, we ask?... Where the tune is familiar and the end emphatic—lovers united, villains discomfited, intrigues exposed—as it is in most Victorian fiction, we can scarcely go wrong, but where the tune is unfamiliar and the end a note of interrogation or merely the information that they went on talking, as it is in Chekhov, we need a very daring and alert sense of literature to make us hear the tune, and in particular those last notes which complete the harmony.
