### President's Letter

Dear Fellow Rotarians and Friends,

We commenced the 25<sup>th</sup> Rotary year of our club in July 2020 with a clear roadmap coupled with our annual theme "Sustainable Living". We also focused on long term assistance with our support for the Karantina Public Hospital Paediatric section via a Global Grant project in collaboration with our local and international Rotary partners. In addition we contributed to the assistance of other Beirut Hospitals badly damaged by the port explosion (refer to Rotary International Magazine article below).

Continued lockdowns throughout the year and a rampant corona virus may have prevented us from holding physical meetings but it did not dampen our spirit to serve the community. Numerous projects and Global Grants in various stages from submission to execution to handover continued unabated. Regular meetings, with much appreciation to the Programs Committee, were maintained throughout the year via zoom with the additional advantage that we were able to welcome our international Rotarian friends and guests – the world was indeed in the palm of our hands.

It goes without say that our country is passing through extraordinarily, if not uniquely, challenging times but we can look back with pride, over the last Rotary year, given the role we have played and the contributions we have made to make life for our fellow citizens a little lighter, a little better. It has indeed been a team effort and I would like to take the opportunity to thank our Board, which has been a cornerstone of stability despite the unsettling times, our committees headed by their respective chairs and the members of our club for their support throughout. I would be remiss if I did not also thank our local and international Rotary partners and friends, too numerous to mention here, for their tangible support and encouragement throughout the year. Without the support of all of you the year could not have been the success that it was.

## Rapid response

With help from around the world, Rotary clubs in Lebanon spring into action after a major disaster

HE CLOUDS OF WHITE smoke billowing into the air over Beirut were an ominous sign that something had gone terribly wrong in a storage hangar at the city's port. Then a fireball of orange smoke and flames erupted straight up into the sky.

The massive explosion on 4 August 2020 killed more than 200 people, displaced hundreds of thousands more from their homes, and destroyed or damaged many structures. It was caused by a dangerous mix of materials that had been stored in the hangar - including ammonium nitrate, oil, kerosene, hydrochloric acid, miles of fuse wire on spools, and 15 tons of fireworks.

As the magnitude of the destruction became known, Rotary clubs in Lebanon and around the world asked themselves what they could do to respond to a disaster that was playing out amid a deadly global pandemic. They soon realized that hospitals, some of which had been severely damaged, were in dire need of help. Beirut-area clubs received donations from clubs around the world; some worked with clubs outside Lebanon to apply for global grants from The Rotary Foundation.

Antoine Kaldany, past president of the Rotary Club of Beirut-Cedars, says the needs were acute at the Lebanese Hospital Geitaoui-University Medical Center. "We knew very early after the blast that Beirut's main hospitals were partially destroyed and overwhelmed by the number of victims," Kaldany says. "The emergency rooms were damaged but were still treating the wounded from the neighborhood. Everybody witnessed the medical staff's heroic actions. Doctors and nurses were operating in dramatic conditions.

Located less than a mile from the explosion, the Geitaoui hospital sustained extensive damage. The Beirut-Cedars club consulted with the Rotary Club of Bad Homburg v.d.H. in Germany and used a global grant to replace medical equipment, including ventilators and monitors for MRI machines, an imaging machine that enables doctors to see inside a patient during surgery, laparoscopic and endoscopy towers, and a cystoscope.

Erhard Krause, the Bad Homburg club's director of international ser-vice, says his club didn't hesitate to work with the Beirut-Cedars club; they'd already been collaborating since 2018 on a project to assist Syrian refugee children. The Bad Hom-burg club also brought in support from nearly 30 other German clubs. "It's satisfying to bring together so many clubs to make a substantial contribution to restoring health care in Lebanon in such difficult times, Krause says.

Also in desperate need of assistance was Karantina Hospital. "The Rotary Club of Beirut Cosmopolitan identified Karantina Hospital for aid because it is the only public hospital in Beirut and because it is recognized for its support of needy pediatric patients. Such patients do not otherwise have easy access to private hospitals," says Habib Saba, the club's 2020-21 president.

When the explosion made international news, the Beirut Cosmopolitan club received offers of help from its network of clubs world-

wide, as well as from clubs it had not connected with previously. "It was a truly humbling experience to have Rotary clubs from all corners of the globe contact us, whether they knew us or not, and, in the wake of the explosion, express their desire to assist." Saba says.

The club partnered on a global grant with the Rotary Club of Whitby Sunrise, Ontario. Steve Rutledge, the Whitby Sunrise club's Beirut relief project chair, says a team made up of members from both clubs reviewed the hospital's critical needs, as well as the scope and estimated costs of the proposed project. The clubs focused on restoring the hospital's pediatric and neonatal wing, using grant funds to replace all of the operating room equipment and provide 19 pediatric beds and other furnishings.

To garner extended support, Whitby Sunrise members created a video that showed a health care worker making a plea for help while walking through the damaged pediatric ward; then the club developed Zoom presentations. In total, 60 clubs from seven districts in Canada were among the more than 150 clubs across the globe that participated in the global grant. "The scale of this global grant project, in terms of budget and number of collaborating clubs, makes it a showcase of the international goodwill and dedication to service of the Rotary family for a truly worthy cause — children," Saba says.

The Rotary Club of Beyrouth (Beirut) organized another global grant, to supply respiratory devices to a hospital whose equipment had been destroyed as well as to hospitals that received an influx of COVID-19 patients. Rita Méouchy, director of international service projects for the Beyrouth club, says they received support from other clubs in Lebanon and used an online fundraising platform to collect donations. They also received offers

Another grant was awarded to the Rotary Club of Kesrouan, Lebanon, which is supplying three hu-midifiers with high-flow oxygen and one medical ventilator for treating COVID-19 patients. This equipment went to hospitals outside Beirut that have taken in patients who would otherwise have been treated in Beirut hospitals.

Throughout the year since the blast, Rotary members have been steadfast in their support of the Beirut clubs. The assistance "speaks volumes to the Rotary spirit and the universal values that bind us as Rotarians worldwide," Saba says.

Online Business Meeting With HE Mr. Kwon Young-Dae
Ambassador of the Republic of Korea to Lebanon

"FACTORS BEHIND KOREA'S ECONOMIC SUCCESS"

May 4, 2021

On Tuesday May 4, RCBC hosted HE Mr. Kwon Young-Dae Ambassador of the Republic of Korea to Lebanon.



In a talk titled "Factors Behind Korea's Economic Success", Ambassador Young-Dae chronicled the Korean economic miracle from a devastating war that ravaged the country and divided it into two Koreas, to being the present day powerhouse. There were four guiding principles that fueled this transformation: Research and Development led by the State, Export, Investment in Human Resources and a strong work ethics. As a result, GDP per capita rose from less than \$100 in the fifties to more than 30 thousand today.

The evolution of the industrial base is also worth noting, The start was with light industry followed by focus on heavy industry. The next phase was building a strong Service industry and finally turning Koreas into a Technical capital-intensive industrial hub. Korea today is gearing up to enter the 4th industrial revolution based on Al, Robotics, Electric car battery and a Hydrogen Electric car.

The journey was not without its many challenges: the Asian Financial crisis two decades ago, and more recently the pandemic that ravaged the world. The values that guided the nation through difficult and good times are called Sum-Bi Spirit Values. Those are based on Loyalty, Piety, Benevolence, Righteousness, and Propriety.

The pride of country and passion was resonant with HE's remarks. If only Sum-Bi will be adopted in countries where the absence of these values is the major obstacle that stops the wheel of development and prosperity from moving forward. Lessons to be learned!

A Lebanese-Canadian, with a BA in Agriculture Engineering from AUB and a MS in Business Management and Economics, Ramy joined Berytech to lead the Incubation and Entrepreneurship Business Development arm that supports innovative Lebanese startups and SMEs. He designed and leads the A.C.T. Smart Innovation Hub initiative, a first of its kind in MENA focusing on both Agtech and Cleantech. He actively supports social causes such as education, sustainability, agriculture, environment and gender equity.

In a highly detailed and scientific presentation, Mr. Boujawdeh identified the challenges in the Agri sector and how to turn these challenges into opportunities.

The challenges identified are: Global food security problems such as population growth, water, land degradation, political turmoil. Other challenges include brain drain, poor practices and lack of innovation. These challenges are juxtaposed with strong human capital, striving entrepreneurial ecosystem, government interest in productive sectors, funding opportunities, international expertise and the MENA market. The recommendations to the road of translating plans into action are:

- Promoting partnerships with NGOs respective ministries to generate interest in the Agri sector.
- Promoting Spin-off with small group of companies engaged in Innovation.
- Working with universities on selection of research projects that can be commercialized
- Holding more Agri- Food Ideation camps to promote the concept of Smart Agri-Food Innovations.






Online Business Meeting With Dr. Sherene Seikaly
Associate Professor of History at the University of California
"THE MATTER OF TIME: HISTORICAL LESSONS ON SURVIVAL"

June 1, 2021



In a riveting, soulful and sincere presentation, Dr. Sherene took us into a very personal journey of her ancestor Naim Cotran and how the different time periods he lived through witnessed a change of social status reflective of those periods. Dr. Saikaly is an Associate Professor of History at University of California, Santa Barbara and is the author of a book and coedits the Journal of Palestine Studies and Jadaliyya.

Following the lessons of a ghostly ancestor, Sherene Seikaly discussed the story of her great-grandfather, Naim Cotran. Her piece, "The Matter of Time" began in Sudan in 1916 and ended in Lebanon in 1951. She traced Naim's multiple subject positions from a white-adjacent colonial official in Omdurman, to a "backward" and "rootless" native in Palestine, to a dispossessed refugee in Lebanon. Seikaly spoke of the multiplicity and ultimate narrowing of subjectivities under settler colonial rule, which initiated the temporal abeyance and the presence-absence that Palestinians wrestle with until this day. She recently stumbled across family papers that she did not know existed. From them she learned that her great-grandfather had been haunting her thinking and research for the last two decades. She wrote a book about him without knowing it. In her talk, Seikaly took up Naim's invitation to escape national and colonial epistemologies, and ponder the relationships between historical writing and autobiography.

In the discussion, Seikaly fielded questions about the Palestinian condition in the wake of the forcible expulsion of Palestinians in East Jerusalem, the Palestinian Unity Uprising, and the Israeli assault on Gaza in May 2021. She insisted on the ongoing colonial condition and Israeli apartheid that Palestinians are subject to, while also demanding that the moment requires deep self-reflection and critique of Palestinian politics.














## **Online Club Assembly**
