Letter from the Editor

Dear Fellow Rotarians,

Every month has a theme and a mission....

October is the month of Economic and Community Development Month, but it is also the month where on October 24, Rotary marks World Polio Day, a day of celebrating the ongoing success of the fight against Polio. Thanks to the joint efforts of Rotary, the world governments and the Global Polio Eradication Initiative, the number of Polio cases went down from 350,000 a year to just a few in 2017. In 1995, Rotary started the Polio Plus Program to fund and support national immunizations days in Polio endemic countries. In 2007, Rotary entered a partnership with the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation, two philanthropists who are pillars in this fight.

Rotary International President Ian H.S. Riseley announced that Rotary is committed to raising \$50 million every year for the next three years, an amount that will be matched 2-to-1 by the Gates Foundation, which triples the money raised by Rotary throughout the year.

We, as Rotarians, should stay committed and engaged in our fight for the eradication of Polio, a disease that debilitates our children and deprives them of an otherwise normal and vibrant life. Together we can help End Polio Now.

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#### October 17: Dinner Meeting

The guest speaker was HE Glen Miles *(Photo RHS)*, ambassador of Australia to Lebanon. In his remarks Ambassador Miles reviewed the historical ties between the two countries. He noted that the first immigrant from Lebanon, Massoud Al Fakri, landed in Adelaide in 1854. Since then, waves of Lebanese immigrated to Australia, settling in multiple cities and building thriving communities that played and continue to play a critical role in the economic development of the country.

He also noted the painful history of Australia's military presence in Lebanon





Australia's military presence in Lebanon during the two world wars. He highlighted the little-known fact that some 250 Australian soldiers were laid to rest in Beirut war cemetery.



He also pointed out the contributions Lebanese make to political and cultural lives in Australia. Names like Dame Marie Bashir, New South Wales longest serving governor, Steve Bricks the former premier of Victoria (1997-2007) and David Malouf the acclaimed writer and play

wright, are examples of the contribution of Lebanese immigrants to social, economic and political lives in the country. He pointed out that there are officially over 200,000 Australians of Lebanese descent, but the real figure is likely double that. Still, he believes that the Lebanese still look towards Europe and North



America for opportunities in Education and Business rather than Australia for lack of understanding of what the country has to offer. Fields ranging from Agribusiness worth \$45 billion, Tourism worth \$120 billion, natural Resources like gold and gas worth \$120 billion and Education where Australia is the third most popular destination of foreign students choosing to study overseas- more than France, Germany and Canada.







### October 24 : Business Meeting & International Polio Day



Business meeting with guest speaker Mrs.Rajaa Ghusaini Sarieddine *(Photo LHS)* Mrs Ghusaini is a professor at the Lebanese University, Faculty of Demography and social Sciences and a lecturer at other universities. She published studies on minorities in Lebanon and is an activist in local and international organizations. She is also a member of Rotary Club Chouf. The topic of her presentation "Increasing Urban Population in Lebanon and its Social Implications" touched upon the evolution of urbanization in Greater Beirut Area, the increase of population from 1.2 million in 2006 to 2.4 million in 2016.

The causes of rapid urbanization:

- Increase in net internal migration
- Increased life expectancy from 68.7 years in 2000 to 77.9 years in 2016
- Presence of Palestinian refugee camps
- An informal settlement of Syrian refugees

She goes on to conclude that if the overall situation of the population growth in

Greater Beirut is unchecked then that will promote the ongoing global contractual organization that lack Lebanese essence, the Beirut residents will continue to have value-based and identity-based conflicts and the Beirut identity will be more shattered.

October 24 is International Polio Day which was celebrated around the world. On this occasion, Dr.Riad Fouad Saade *(Photo LHS)* (PP of Rotary Club Beyrouth) gave a synopsis about Launching PolioPlus Program in Lebanon 1986-1995.



In his remarks, Dr.Saade stated that in 1986 Lebanon joined BERELICOSMOPO the international effort of child immunization.

A joint effort of the Ministry of Health, UNICEF and WHO established plans for the program to be implemented at country level.

Rotary Club de Beyrouth spearheaded the program and a

PolioPlus Project application form was submitted to the Rotary Foundation in 1987 which adopted the PolioPlus Program in Lebanon in November 1987.

Dr. Saade was the project coordinator who accepted US\$ 175,000 to be spent over five years to cover cost of vaccines and social mobilization. The success that this program achieved in Lebanon despite the fact that the country was torn by years of dreadful wars is a tribute to the Rotary spirit and the resilience of the Lebanese people in times of adversity.









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#### October 31: Business meeting

The meeting featured presentations by members of BCRAC, the Beirut Cosmopolitan Rotaract Club, introducing their board members, and outlining their action plan for the year. This was followed by a brief presentation on Public Image, its importance in club operations and ways and means of promoting the club image.
