"Letter from the Editor"

Almost a year into our fight against the Corona virus, the world is going from one lockdown to another, as the grip of the virus does not seem to abate and a successful, tried vaccine has not yet seen the light of day. We, Rotarians, immediately joined the fight against this deadly virus because Rotary is an organization well-seasoned in the fight against viruses and communicable diseases. The fight against the devastating Polio virus and its success was a joint effort of RI, WHO and the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation. In 1985, RI launched its Polio Plus program and after 35 years of Rotary's relentless pursuit of the virus one of the three remaining countries, Nigeria, was declared Polio Free in August of this year. This leaves only Pakistan and Afghanistan where Rotary perseveres to eradicate the remaining cases. Every case treated, translates into hundreds of children saved.

Not Surprisingly Rotary also celebrates World Polio Day on October 24th each year with Rotary clubs around the world undertaking initiatives to put the spotlight on totally eradicating the dreaded disease emphasizing the catchphrase "End Polio Now" with the objective of ultimately arriving at a Polio free world.

Additionally in more recent times the vast infrastructure of the Polio eradication program is being leveraged to protect the vulnerable from COVID-19 especially in polio endemic countries. From Pakistan to Nigeria, the experience gained in polio eradication is helping in the governments' response to the new deadly corona virus. Trained specialists in the STOP program, part of the Polio Eradication Initiative, are actively supporting in preparations for response to COVID-19 in 13 countries worldwide. The program naturally recognizes the devastating impact that communicable diseases have and is therefore fully committed to supporting National Health Systems by providing expertise and assistance to help contain and mitigate the Covid-19 pandemic and in that respect is also proving invaluable.

Rotary is committed to the major challenges facing the world. In addition to the ongoing fight against deadly viruses, Rotary is now placing special emphasis on the fight against environmental damage, the undermining of natural ecosystems, the tackling of climate change, etc. The Rotary Foundation Trustees and the RI Board of Directors have introduced a new area of focus, the seventh: Supporting the Environment. This now proudly joins the other six areas of focus: Peace and Conflict Prevention/Resolution, Disease Prevention and Treatment; Water and Sanitation; Maternal and Child Health; Basic Education and Literacy; and last but not least Economic and Community Development.

In line with the importance of the Environment area of focus and with our club's theme of this Rotary year - Sustainable Living - we invited Dr. Christopher Puttock, Chair of Environmental Sustainability Rotary Action Group (ESRAG), to speak to us about Navigating the New Opportunities in Supporting the Environment.

As Rotarians we are all proud to be at the leading edge in identifying pertinent solutions to tackle plaguing problems that face our communities across the globe.



2.3 Biodiversity - Sustainable Food Production



pre-industrial agriculture - indigenous, nomadic, subsistence rotations, and small multi-cropped/livestock farms, supporting a very large workforce (~4 billion)

modern agriculture - monoculture farms with extensive



irrigation, fertilizers, pesticides, machinery and modern cultivars, supporting a very small workforce (~4 million) commercial fishing - open ocean longline and nearshore gillnets



best management practices - used for many decades but now dependent upon big industry; one size does not fit all; fisheries can also reduce by-catch





2.4 Biodiversity – Environmental Resilience



stewardship - proactively preempting the human footprint, preventing biodiversity loss; mitigating conflict and enabling co-existence



• cultural traditions - honouring and enabling connectivity to the land; melding together best management practices



justice - recognizing the value of ecological services to the cycle of life, providing equal access to food production and human health, and mitigating conflict over resources











3. Linear to Circular Economy - cradle to cradle



• innovation – creating products with a deliberate end-of-life repurposing; making human settlements resilient and enduring, minimizing energy use and heat production



 distribution – improving the efficiency of processing, packaging, marketing, sales and consumption; reducing losses and transit costs using smart infrastructure



recycle - maximizing repurposing of design, diverting food waste from landfills into compost; converting concrete, plastics, and metals into new products





4. Clean and Renewable Energy - locally



· local solar - providing affordable electricity; direct power: solar stoves, night-lights; stored power for electric vehicles, computers, and smart phones; challenges are battery energy storage



local wind and watermills - providing pumps for irrigation systems to farms, to mill grain, to supply water to villages, and to generating energy



local methane capture – using biodigesters to convert organic waste to clean gas; minimizing wood harvesting, burning fossil fuels, and reducing air pollution





"BEIRUT RECOVERY COLLABORATION"

October 20,2020

The recent collaboration between Rotary Club Beirut Cosmopolitan and Edinburgh Direct Aid in the rehabilitation work done was highlighted in this meeting. President Don started by saying that connecting with Beirut and Edinburgh Direct Aid (EDA) is a unique moment in time. He resembled Edinburgh to Beirut as cities with tremendous spirits! He took us through a visual tour of Edinburgh and the beauty of the Scottish country side and gave a brief history about RC Edinburgh and RC Leeds.



The first meeting of RC Edinburgh was held in 1912 and the first RI Convention outside of North America was held there as well in 1921. Paul Harris, whose wife came from Edinburgh, visited the city twice. The club is 89 members strong, involved in local and international projects while strengthening their contacts with other European Clubs.

The Rotary Club of Leeds also dates back to 1916 and is the second of RC Edinburgh 26 daughter clubs. They are very active in schools, empowering youth locally and internationally.

Dr. Dennis Rutvitz gave an overview about the extensive humanitarian work of Edinburgh Direct Aid. The work in Beirut after the August 4 explosion was spearheaded by Maggie Tookey who was on the ground for two and a half months. In her words, the devastation was breathtaking and shocking and the work was endless. Seven days a week, work was ongoing on repairing windows and doors to rehabilitate the damaged homes. Our club, RCBC, donated glass for this effort and a total of 81 homes were covered.







The latest project in Beirut for EDA is finishing the Music Center in Gemmayze, one of the badly destroyed areas in Beirut. This center will serve 300 poor children to introduce them to the world of music. RC Edinburgh and RC Leeds were supporting Maggie's work on the ground.

Once again, many thanks to EDA and all the volunteers for helping the city of Beirut overcome its

tragedy. Rotary spirit at its best!


Before Ms. Bitar's presentation, Mr. Jean Noel Baleo, the new Middle East Director of AUF made brief introductory remarks about the role of AUF in the world and the Middle East. AUF is the world Association of French and non-French speaking higher education and research institution which brings together 1007 universities on all continents in 119 countries. In Lebanon, AUF cooperates with all the major universities to support research and digital campuses.

Ms. Bitar's presentation described her work as coordinator of the AUF project (DEEL) related to developing student entrepreneurship in Lebanon and project SAFIR in the campuses of the MENA region aiming at creating and strengthening University incubators.

A Q&A session followed the presentation with a proposal from a Rotarian to explore the advantages of a cooperation between AUF, SAFIR and RYLA.
