Business Meeting, October 8, 2013 Guest Speaker Engineer (ENG) Ramy El Khoury, "Earthquake Risk in Lebanon"

Our guest speaker (see LHS photo below) was introduced by RT Samir El-Khoury, RCBC Program Committee Chair (see RHS photo below).

ENG Ramy Ramy Rafik El-Khoury is a Director and Associate of Rafik El-Khoury & Partners and CEO of the company's UAE and Saudi Arabian Offices. A Civil Engineer with over 20 years experience, he holds a Bachelor in Civil Engineering Degree and a Masters' Degree in Earthquake Engineering and Structural Dynamics from Imperial College, London.

ENG El-Khoury has represented Lebanon in the Program for Reducing Earthquake Losses in the Eastern Mediterranean Region since 1998 and plays a key role in a number of regional and global efforts designed to understand and deal with seismic hazards.



He described earthquakes as natural disasters that so far are unpredictable — whether as to timing or to magnitude. The essence of Earthquake Engineering is to help design structures that remain standing and hopefully do not kill when an earthquake does occur -- for once an earthquake has struck in a given area around the globe, it will definitely strike again, with at least the same magnitude as before. The longest fault in Lebanon is the Yammouneh Fault. This is the northward continuation of the Levantine or Dead Sea Fault system which has been at the origin of a number of major destructive earthquakes. Upon entering Lebanon through the Galilee heights, the Levantine Fault System changes into a more complex system of braided faults.

ENG El Khouy also spoke about new design and construction norms based on modern design and construction technologies and using new materials that help buildings -- including those that are high rise -- resist high intensity earthquakes. These norms have been and are being applied in a number of new buildings in Lebanon (in the Solidere quarter of Beirut for example) as well as in the Gulf countries (specially in the UAE) and in the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia.

Business Meeting -- October 22, 2013

Guest Speaker: Mrs. Ninette Kelley, United Nations High Commisssion for Refugees (UNHCR)

UNHCR Representative in Lebanon Mrs. Ninette Kelly (see photo RHS) gave a presentation entitled 'How is UN High Commission for Refugees coping with the flood of refugees from Syria into Lebanon?'.

By end 2013, the UNHCR expects the number of Syrian refugees in Lebanon to reach about one million — up from 175,000 end 2012 and 5,000 end 2011. As a result, trade, investments and consumer confidence are down, pressure on public services is up and the gap between funds needed and funds received has widened. The cost of stabilisation is now estimated at US \$ 2.5 billion. In a broader perspective, nearly two million Syrians have fled their country since the beginning of 2011, half of them children. Of the one million children, more than 75% are under the age of 11.



It is difficult to envision a realistic solution in the foreseeable future. Ideally, one would build camps with the help of the international community on the Lebanese side of the border with Syria -- which camps would be fully under Lebanese control. This would both help control the inflow of refugees and help improve the quality of medical and humanitarian services. One could also build camps within Syria -- in areas endowed with a minimum of infrastructure and so far spared by the war -- over which no-fly zones would be imposed. All such solutions need Security Council resolutions as well as funding, both of which are difficult to obtain.
