





Presentation Topic

'MEA: An Airline's Journey Through Crisis'









The last few months of 2024 were nothing short of traumatic to Lebanon. Bombs were raining on different parts of the country relentlessly and savagely. Lives of people and their well-being were impacted greatly. Life as we know it came to a halt, businesses and schools shut down, airlines suspended their flights in and out till further notice. But, hope springs eternal and Middle East Airlines provided that ray of hope for people to stay connected to the outside world. The whole company, pilots and crew were subjecting themselves to great danger every time an aircraft took off or landed. An article was written about this in the New York Times in praise of MEA and its resilience.

To honor and shed more light on the heroic feat of MEA, our club decided to host in its first meeting in January 2025 Mr. Marwan Habre, Head of Commercial Division, including Sales, Marketing Strategy and Alliances. This meeting was cohosted by our dear friends Rotary Clubs of Beirut Cedars, De Beyrouth and Metn Gate.

Mr. Habre enjoys 20 years of experience with multinational airlines. He is motivated by the challenge of leading teams towards achieving exceptional standards in business performance via effective communication and coaching, improved processes and efficiencies. He has extensive experience in all facets of airline operations, data analytics, pricing and revenue management, airline network development, launching of new route and staff development.

In a very interesting presentation, Mr. Habre took us into the back alley of MEA and revealed some very interesting facts. For us, what we care about is flight destinations and securing a seat on a flight, but there are layers upon layers of complexity and how all the pieces fall in place due to meticulous hard work of all concerned parties. MEA has faced challenges since 2019, with the financial crisis in Lebanon, and Covid 19 that forced the airport to shut down for three months. MEA did not lay off any employees and kept the company running. The worst challenge came in October 2023 when Lebanon was forced into a very unpleasant war situation where the company had to reduce its aircraft down to 8, and deal with a drop of revenue and coverage. In airline lingo, SLOT management is a very important word in operations: permission to park aircrafts. When this war started, MEA had to find places to park its 15 aircrafts not in use. These parking slots are not readily available and a lot of juggling is required to respect the airports schedules and availability of parking spaces. MEA was operating on reduced schedules and frequency of flights to keep connections and not lose slots. The SLOT coordinators in Europe had to be very understanding under the prevailing circumstances, thus affording MEA smooth operations to keep Lebanon connected to the world. With relative peace prevailing now and a shaky cease fire, MEA is eager to forge ahead with its development plans that were arrested for the past five years.

In the name of all Lebanese, we thank MEA for its resilience and operation in the line of fire and we thank Mr. Habre for sharing the heroic acts of everyone in MEA to keep Lebanon connected to the world.

Why Palliative Care Matters?



Presentation Topic

"Back to Basics in Health through Primary Healthcare" Due to the sudden onslaught of violence that led to the displacement of thousands and thousands of people from the comfort of their homes to shelters across the country, a situation that disrupted all infrastructure in the country including the health sector. RCBC invited as a guest speaker Dr. Randa Hamadeh, Head of the Primary Health care and social Health Department at the Ministry of Public Health to shed light on how the government dealt with all the challenges in this particular sector.


Dr. Hamade, in a detailed presentation, shared the following facts:

- There are 325 Primary health care centers in Lebanon, with only 5% of the public health sector expenditure allocated to them.
- In emergencies, these centers play two roles: provision of health needs to the displaced and host communities and support in management of injuries and saving lives.
- Linkage of all shelters to the primary Healthcare providers, provision of services in shelters and continuity of service to local communities.
- Securing continuity of medications and vaccine supply chain.

With all the challenges that Lebanon faced in the last few months, the diligent oversight of the Primary healthcare centers kept communicable diseases under control and prevented the onslaught of new ones that can rapidly spread under such conditions of displacement and overcrowding of shelters.

Dr. Hamade summed up her presentation by outlining the future plan for Primary Health care centers:

- 1. Refine the Emergency Relief Model and expand its scope.
- 2. Maintain the country's Polio-Free Status and increase vaccination rates.
- 3. Ensure a steady supply of essential drugs.


"Recent transformational trends in the Diversity, Equity & Inclusion Landscape"
