# "Education is the most powerful weapon which you can use to change the world."

September in Rotary is the month of Basic Education and Literacy. Since its inception, Rotary has a strong global focus on education as part of its mission of Service Above Self. It sees education as the foundation for breaking the cycle of poverty, promoting peace, and building stronger communities. More than 775 million people over the age of 13 are illiterate. That's 17% of the world's adult population. Rotary's goal is to strengthen the capacity of communities to support basic education, reduce gender disparity in education, and increase adult literacy.

According to the World Health Organization, if all women completed primary education, there would be 66% fewer maternal deaths. A child born to a mother who can read is 50% more likely to survive past the age of five. And if all students in low-income countries left school with basic reading skills, 171 million people could be lifted out of poverty that translates into a 12% cut in world poverty. These are jarring facts, and the world is reacting positively to this by increasing literacy rates and narrowing the gender gap in education. This is where the work of the Rotary Foundation comes to light, and the work of Rotary Clubs shines as they come up with programs to help in the fight against illiteracy.

In Lebanon, the education system has been taxed at multiple levels. The financial crisis affected the public schools' system, the influx of over 1.5 million refugees into the country that created an additional burden on schools, resources, salaries, infrastructure followed by the Beirut Port Explosion that forced some schools to shut down. But, education reigns supreme in Lebanon, and with limited resources schools were operating at full capacity. Rotary clubs sprang to action, providing solar panels to schools and universities, donating computers and school supplies to needy schools and even creating out of the box programs to keep students up to speed with the latest technologies.

As Rotarians, we are always researching and assessing needs in our communities. The harder the challenge, the higher we rise and provide support. As for education, we believe that educating a child is educating a whole village and community. We believe that no one should be left behind and when we Unite for Good, things can only get better!

**Presentation Topic: 'Education Transformation in Lebanon'**

September in Rotary is Basic Education and Literacy month. In line with the theme, Rotary Club Beirut Cosmopolitan hosted Ms. Maysoun Chehab to talk about state of education in Lebanon. Ms. Chehab possesses a wealth of expertise in program conceptualization, development, monitoring and evaluation. She plays a pivotal role in shaping policies and programs across numerous countries in the Levant, Gulf region and Yemen. She is committed to fostering inclusive, equitable and high-quality education systems that propel communities towards a brighter and more prosperous future.

Lebanon historically was a leader in literacy and quality of education. Its schools and universities boasted of high standards and attracted students from all over the region and the west. The high academic success propelled students to higher levels of innovation and excellence in the fields of science, math and technology. Unfortunately, years of civil war that culminated in the worst economic and financial crisis in the history of the country, wounded and scarred the education system in Lebanon, especially at the public school's level.

Following the Beirut Port Explosion in 2020, Li Beirut was started as the UNESCO's Flagship urban rehabilitation program, mobilizing nearly \$ 40 million to restore education, culture and media actors. The major achievements:

- Rehabilitated 145 education facilities: 95 schools, 20 TVET institutions and 30 university buildings.
- Provided equipment, materials, and furniture to schools and universities.
- Supported over 28,000 students with stationery kits and learning supplies.
- Strengthened distance learning in blast affected areas. 100 public schools were equipped with digital devices, 2000+ teachers trained on digital and online teaching, and psychosocial support was given to 500 teachers, staff and 300 caregivers.
- Developed online training courses for teachers to ensure continuity of learning.

Education is the most important to every Lebanese. Its true that the country took a major hit but with perseverance and political will, there will be light at the end of the tunnel.

**Education Environmental Sustainability in Rotary Clubs Every Club Climate Friendly** 

Septembet 16,2025

Education is never confined to one field, area or age group. Education is multilayered, and generational, and it is in a constant state of evolution. Despite all the challenges that Lebanon is passing through, the desire to learn, innovate and be ahead in every field of education never ceases. Building on that, the meeting on September 16,2025 was solely to introduce a program to teach students about waste management and climate conservation.

Our guest speakers were three brilliant Rotarians, accomplished in their fields, who shared with us the projects they are working on in educating the youth.

The first speaker was Hana Abi Tarabay, President of Rotary Club Lebanon Eco, who is an agricultural engineer and a Masters in Horticulture. She is also an environmental activist who worked with World Vision and Waste Management Coalition and is the co-founder of Lebanese Composters. Hana went through the program designed with 5 objectives: Educate on solid waste; Promote reduce, reuse, recycle; encourage sustainable habits, develop young environmental advocates and support proper recycling practices in schools.

The target audience will be elementary to high school students; and the key topics will be environment, health, carbon footprint and the link to UN sustainable SDGs and start environment clubs with student delegates.



The second speaker, **Past President Rana El Hindi**, also holds dual degrees in Agriculture, Nutrition and Dietetics and a masters in environmental science. She is currently an ambassador for ESRAG and its Climate Solutions Task Force. Her work bridges health, environment and lifestyle to promote sustainable agriculture, climate action and holistic well-being.

In a detailed and very scientific presentation, Rana went through a plethora of facts and figures on why environment matters. As an ESRAG (Environmental Sustainability Rotary Action Group) ambassador, ESRAG wants to make Rotary net zero emissions by 2040 with the help of Climate solutions task force. She started by a wakeup call that carbon pollution is causing the planet to overheat dangerously with rising sea levels. She outlined the impact of climate change on human health: Pollution and increasing allergens, extreme heat, drought, environmental degradation, wildfires and smoke, degraded living conditions and social inequities, food systems inequalities, and water quality. In Rotary, climate change has a negative impact on all the areas of focus but every club can reduce the carbon foot print. This can be done by starting with meetings to make them virtual/ hybrid, Reducing printed material and food waste and by sourcing local vegan foods. We can also address transportation by reducing air travel and encourage carpooling and in general promote energy efficient practices with club operations.

The third speaker was **President Rana Kanso**, **Rotary Club Aley West**, who holds a Masters degree in Curriculum Management and Design. She is a seasoned educational consultant and is currently a university instructor at Balamand University and cofounder of the Lebanese Organization for Peace Building and Sustainable development. Rana's presentation was titled: Eco Quest: A Summer Journey for a Sustainable Future.

Rana started by sharing the program goal which is to foster a deep, lasting connection between students and the natural world by transforming their understanding of environmental issues and empowering them to take meaningful action towards a sustainable future, specifically aligned with the Global Goals for Sustainable Development. 
Rt. Amal was very impressed with what Rotary does in Lebanon and the spirit of fellowship.
