

In line with the Club's commitment to DEI, our club Beirut Cosmopolitan was the first club in Lebanon and District 2452 to become an inclusive club. It was launched in January as the club that welcomes people with disabilities, in line with our commitment to the Rotary principles of Diversity, Equity and Inclusion with full support from our members and D2452 Governor George Azar.

On the Global Grants front, we inaugurated in January the most important GG in our 28 years. Installation of medical equipment in the maternity and neonatal pediatric ward in the Beirut Governmental Hospital – Karantina that was totally destroyed after the Beirut Port explosion on August 4, 2020. This great accomplishment could not have happened without the support of over 140 Rotary clubs around the world. This is also a testament to the power of the Rotary Foundation and its support in every corner in the world.

During my Presidency, the club bylaws were revised and both the Rotary Code of Conduct and the DEI Code of Conduct were included. The Rotaract Bylaws were also endorsed stressing the Commitment of Rotaract to DEI.

The club hosted many guest speakers, in person and on zoom, all distinguished in their own rights. The year culminated with the club hosting the Ambassador of Japan as the guest speaker.

Generous donations by members, enabled the Club to host a group of under privileged children for Christmas and Ramadan celebrations. Those two annual events are considered among the most rewarding.

Club members participated in the District Conference in May, that took place in Lebanon and was a very successful conference with a host of brilliant speakers on all current topics in Rotary coupled with events that reflected the Rotary fellowship spirit at its best.

As outgoing President, I will pass on the baton to Incoming President Amal Talhouk, and wish her, the board and club members continued success.

I would also like to thank wholeheartedly all the members and board for their support through some challenging times and for the belief in our club and its mission. Let us all unite in service and work for the good of our community.

General tips to keep in mind:

- Language matters. Use terminology that is inclusive.
- Treat adults as adults.
- Speak directly to people with disabilities.
- Listen patiently and attentively.
- Remember that a person's mobility is part of their personal space. Don't move a cane or wheelchair without their permission.
 - Not all disabilities are visible, but that does not make them less real.
 - People with cognitive or psychological disabilities have varying ways of coping with their conditions.
 - Please note that it is offensive to pretend to have a disability, and disability simulation experiences should be done for design (service) to present services.
 - design/navigational purposes only.
 > If you are unsure how to interact with a person with disabilities, ask them!

Ambassador of Japan to Lebanon

"Lebanon - Japan: Seeking to Further Strengthen Friendly and Cooperative Relations" For the final meeting of RY 22-23, RCBC hosted the Japanese Ambassador to Lebanon, HE Masayuki Magoshi, to be our guest speaker. His excellency was accompanied by Ms Chie Nakamura, the Economic Cooperation Attaché at the Japanese Embassy. The event took place at the Phoenicia Hotel in the presence of other ambassadors, AG Aida Daou and members of the club. This meeting was also attended by a special guest from Egypt Senator and Cadre Salwa el Haddad on a mission from Rotary International.

HE Magoshi started his presentation with a heartfelt message about his love for Lebanon and how disappointing it is to see the decline in the overall status of the country. He could not stress enough how important it is for the Lebanese to unite and take charge of their fate by capitalizing on the enormous human talent and resources the country so richly has. He went on to outline the rich history of cooperation between Japan and Lebanon since 1954, and noted that in 2024, the 70th anniversary of the establishment of diplomatic relations will be celebrated.

Before the civil war , there were more than 3000 Japanese nationals and 100 offices of Japanese private companies. Sadly now, there are only 100 nationals and no offices for companies!!

He went on to talk about strengthening and enhancing bilateral relations through diplomatic activities in politics, economic cooperation, consular affairs, PR and culture and support for the stability of Lebanon. Moreover, the Japanese embassy collaborates with related organizations and is very strong in the economic cooperation and assistance to Lebanon:

- Providing solar power system for 122 public schools
- In-Kind food distribution to vulnerable Lebanese people
- Provision of medical equipment for Ghubeiri municipality
- Rehabilitation of residential heritage in Beirut
- Installation of 15 hand wash stations in schools

In addition to the above there is a strong academic and sports support and exchange, not forgetting the love of the Lebanese for Japanese cuisine and culture.

HE Magoshi firmly believes that the beauty of Lebanon, its climate, the collective will and unity of the Lebanese, will play a major role in the rebirth of the country! Food for thought!

Rt. Jean Paul represents our club aptly when he visits clubs in France.


Most recently he met with Francois Xavier Mbouyom, President of RC Neuilly les Sablons and ADG of District 1660.
