A very worth while project was transporting the blind to Roseville monthly for recreation.

As requested by Rotary International, Francis had Richard Lee compile a history of our Club. That history is chapter one in this volume.

Six new members were initiated during his year.

John Perry - Thirtieth President Omar Creer - Secretary

John had a very successful year as Rotary President. Some of his projects were: painting the Boy Scout Hall, building the sidewalks around the Bleachers in McBean Park, and planting trees in the park.

The attendance in his year was 98.6 per cent. John had 17 consecutive 100 per cent meetings.

1956-1957

Richard Neville - Thirty-first President Omar Creer - Secretary

Dick was one of our very popular presidents. He thoroughly believed in and practiced the Rotary slogan: "Service Above Self." All Rotary projects progressed during his year.

His early demise in June 1972 was a shock to our entire community.

1957-1958

Carleton Hall - Thirty-second President Arnold Reese - Secretary

Carleton's year was extremely eventful. Frank Farnsworth almost sawed John Perry's leg off when they were working the Camp Rada (Roseville Automobile Dealers Association) Boy Scout Hall on Gold Hill Road. John was rushed to the Roseville Hospital where they stitched the wound. John survived.

Carleton and Pershing Wyatt purloined the Lions Club charter at their Charter night dinner which caused much confusion. The episode touched off a friendly feud between the two clubs. The Lions in revenge swiped Carleton's gavel and returned it to him frozen in a 200 pound cake of ice.

Rotarians Hall, Coppin, Clinger and Jerry Jansen built an outdoor barbecue and a walk-in box at Camp Pahatsi Boy Scout Camp. It was reported that they kept their spirits up with Cutty Sark and Soda (whatever that is).

Carleton finished a year as president of the Benicia Rotary Club and stated that he showed them the Lincoln method of conducting a Rotary Club.

1958-1959

Robert Schlundt - Thirty-third President Arnold Reese - Secretary

1959-1960

John Carnesecca - Thirty-fourth President Jack Griggs - Secretary

Pleasant Hall which netted our club \$1,800 (our bank balance was only \$125). 1960-1961

Louis Franceschi - Thirty-fifth President Jack Griggs - Secretary

Without doubt Louis Franceschi is one of our most dedicated Rotarians. Important projects in his year were the promotion of the Eye Bank and boosting our per percentage in the Rotary International Foundation Fund.

Louis has traveled extensively and brought to our Club many interesting pennants from foreign clubs.

Joe Wilson - Thirty-sixth President Jack Griggs - Secretary

In 1947, Joe Wilson initiated the idea of having a Blood Bank for Lincoln and vicinity. For three years Joe transported the donors to Sacramento, assisted by Mary McQueary. In 1950 the Rotary Club assumed the sponsorship of the Blood Bank. That year the Mobile Unit came to Lincoln to collect blood. Joe estimated taht to date 3000 pints of blood have been donated probably have a value of \$70,000.00. The Blood Bank serves the Western Placer Unified School District.

Joe also started the project of selling Christmas trees which was a financial success for a few years.

One of his outstanding programs was a Ladies Night when the celebrated John Crose gave a talk on "World Understanding and How to Achieve It."

1962-1963

Jack Griggs - Thirty-seventh President Carlin C. Coppin - Secretary

Having served as secretary, Jack was will versed in the activities of Rotary. His outstanding project was the construction of the rest rooms of McBean Park.

He has served as secretary for many presidents before and after he was president. Jack deserves a lot of credit for his faithful service as secretary of our club. He has served in that capacity for ten years.

1963-1964

All of the usual Rotary activities flourished under Primo's leadership. It was in his year that the cement slab was poured and the frame for the barbecue pit was completed at McBean Park.

Other activities were: a duck dinner with Edward Grey as chairman, ducks provided by Primo and Dr. Nathan Dubin; a

fish derby at Dr. James Ragsdale's pond (first fish caught by Dr. Nathan Dubin), Dick Lee acted as judge of the contest; a bus trip to Candle Stick Baseball Park with the Lincoln Lions Club; a raffle for a heifer to be sent to Japan, Primo received a letter of thanks from the Japanese farmer who received the heifer; started the practice of having Rotarians who misses a meeting throw darts at a target to determine the amount of the fine. The target, in the form of a Rotary wheel, was designed by Ray Johnson of Gladding McBean Co. and was constructed by our local carpenter Edward Russell. Primo was a busy man.

1964-1965

1965-1966

Dr. Nathan Dubin - Fortieth President Jack Griggs - Secretary

The Doctor has traveled extensively and brought us pennants from far away places, Africa, India and Europe. We enjoyed his duck dinners and buck stews.

It was he who asked Dick Lee to bring the history of our club up to date.

Nathan remembers that he and Jack Griggs attended a Rotary work shop in Quincy, a very pleasant experience.

1966-1967

Robert Jiminez - Forty-first President Jack Griggs - Secretary

Bob was a fine president. He levied fines on the least provocation and increased our bank balance substantically.

His big project was the fence around the football field. It cost about \$800.00.

We placed fifth in our district in attendance during his year. Bob ran a lively Club, and we know who was boss.

1967-1968

Larry Alcorn - Forty-second President Jack Griggs - Secretary

Being a banker Larry conducted the affairs of our Club in true banker style. He was very meticulous in all of his undertakings. The Rotary Club needed funds so Larry scheduled a ball game between Placer Nevada League Champions and the Lincoln Union High School Team. The game was decidedly a financial success. Bill Williams was the chairman and took care of the arrangements for the game, and Dr. Nathan Dubin and Dr. Cy Sergis took care of the fatalities.

Another project, "The Big John Circus," was not so successful financially, but the kids enjoyed it. Larry also built the gates for the Lincoln baseball field in McBean Park.

1968-1969

Orrin Hofman - Forty-third President Jack Griggs - Secretary

Orrin must be given credit for initiating one of our most worthy and important projects, namely the establishment of the High School Scholarship Fund. This award of \$100.00 is made annually in the name of our Club.

The patio at the Lincoln Library was built in his year, and all of the usual Rotary activities thrived under his guidance.
