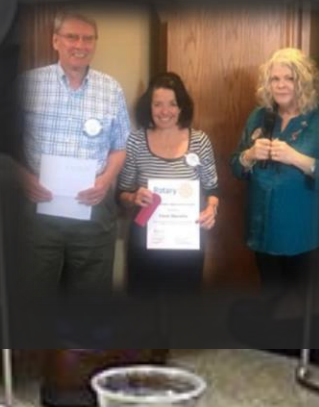

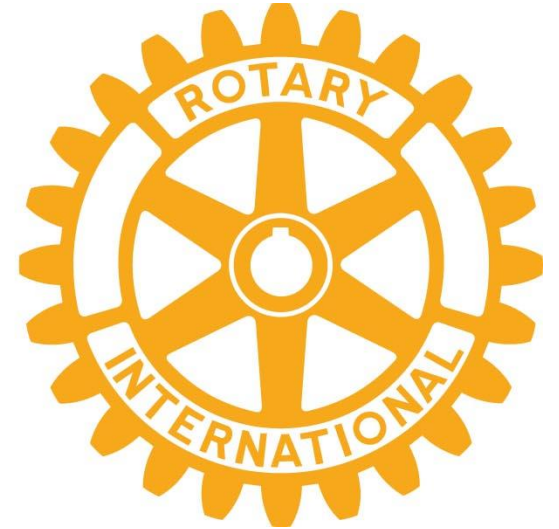

Regardless of his many contributions to the Fox for Kids Charity Golf Tournament, what Late really did was to make dreams come true. For the members of The Rotary Club of SaddleBrooke, Late's involvement guaranteed a successful fund-raiser. For area seniors in high school, Late's presence insured scholarship money to help fund a college education. For children and youth in our area, Late's involvement meant after school tutoring, technology equipment, a robotics program, therapy for special needs children, character education through golf les-



sons, special skills training, and so much more. Yes, Late Olson's work with The Rotary Club of SaddleBrooke made so many dreams come true, for so many people.

To recognize Late for his multiple contributions to The Rotary Club of SaddleBrooke and to children and youth throughout our area, the club awarded Late the highest honor in Rotary. We are so honored to have Brigadier General Ronald E. Shoopman give a Veterans Day Message at our meeting. Brigadier General Ronald E. Shoopman commanded the 162nd Fighter Wing, Arizona Air National

Guard Base located at the Tucson International Airport. Born in Phoenix, Arizona, he graduated with a degree in Aeronautical Engineering from Arizona State University in Tempe. After completing pilot training at Williams Air Force Base, Arizona, in 1973, General Shoopman had various assignments as an A-7D pilot at Davis-Monthan Air Force Base. In 1993, he became the Deputy Commander for Operations and the Vice Commander of the now 162nd Fighter Wing in 1994. He became the wing commander on January 22, 1999. He is a command pilot with the Air Force and has more than 3,600 civilian flying hours!!

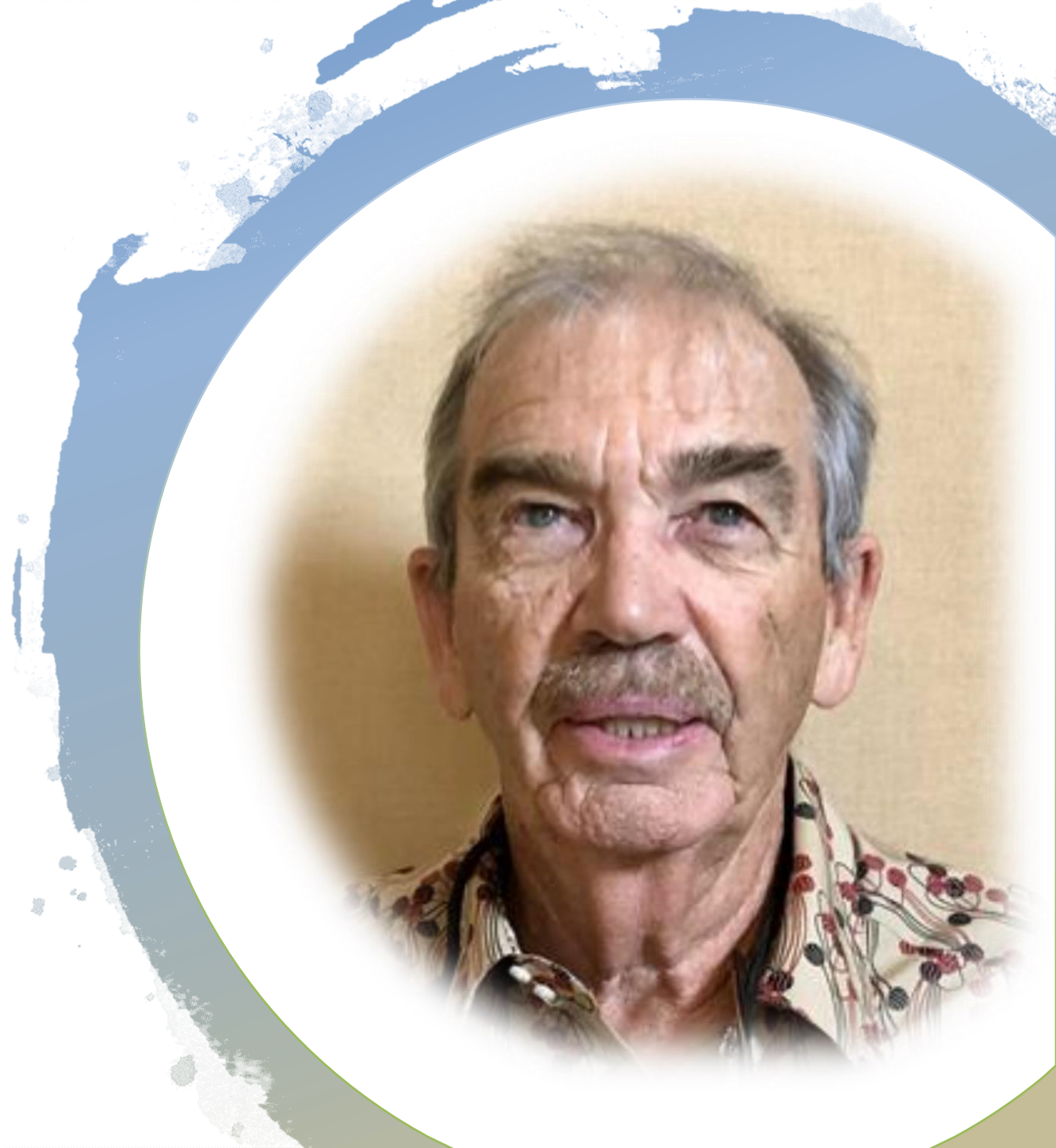

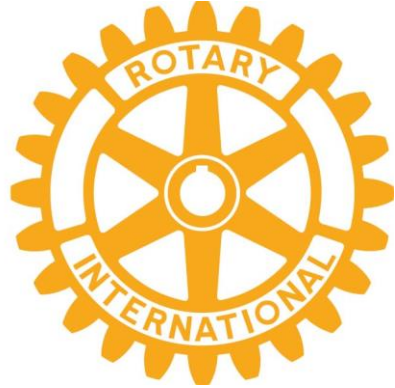

Our speaker today is Werkneh “Werkie” Ourga, a young man who was born in a small village in Ethiopia where there were no hospitals, electricity;

He walked 7 hours to the city to see doctors for the ten-pound tumors on his hands. Unable to receive treatment his dad dropped him off at Mother Teresa Orphanage - Home for Dying and Destitute, a place where desperate parents leave sick kids they can't care for in Ethiopia.

The doctors he saw wanted to amputate his hands in Ethiopia, but he was able to travel to the U.S.A where he had 15 surgeries to save his hands.

Werkneh stayed In the United States and graduated from Westlake High School. He received awards for being a great athlete and inspiring the students. He has spoken at Rotary Clubs Werkie Ourga.
