- Sally and Violette shared some of the success stories that have come out of the grants that they have provided, such as a bread making business that supplies all of the bread to a mining company, as well as some of the challenges with working with women halfway across the world.
- The program has three employees in Lubumbashi that help find the applicants and provide financial education for the women receiving the grants to help them succeed with their business model.
