Summer 2022: Digging Dinosaurs & Building **Museum Collections**

Dr. Julia McHugh has served as the Curator of Paleontology of the Museums of Western Colorado, and jointly as an instructor in the geosciences program at Colorado Mesa University, for over eight years. Dr. McHugh is a leading expert in Morrison Formation paleontology, taphonomy, and amphibian evolution. Her recent collaborative research has included discoveries on tooth replacement mechanisms in sauropods like Apatosaurus, cannibalism in the theropod Allosaurus, and evidence for decay and decomposition ecologies at the Mygatt-Moore Quarry. The recent special exhibition at Dinosaur Journey in Fruita (part of the Museums of Western Colorado), Dinosaurs Macabre was largely based on these recent research projects. She has a B.A. in Geology from Hanover College, a M.S. in Geosciences from Idaho State University, and a Ph.D. in Geoscience from The University of Iowa.

Introduction of Speaker - Paul Demarchi

John Sheehan joined Wes tSprings Hospital and Mind Springs Health as CEO in Aug. of 2022 bringing with him over 25 years experience in the behavioral health field. He started his career as a mental health technician and worked his way up through various management and executive positions. John has vast knowledge of the healthcare industry and the importance of behavioral health as a key component of the healthcare system. Prior to joining Mind Springs Health, John led one of the oldest healthcare exchanges in the country, the Rochester RHIO.

For seven years John served as the CEO for Harbor Toledo, one of the largest behavioral health providers in the Midwest. Prior to that he was Vice President of behavioral health services for Baycare Health System of Clearwater, Florida. The largest non profit private provider of inpatient care in Florida.

Presentation - John Sheehan

Recently there have been some changes to MInd Springs that haven't been seen in a positive light locally. The model of community mental health organizations like this one - over 50 years old - was established in the Kennedy administration and is now in need of some significant upgrades. It is now becoming recognized that mental health service is a vital component to overall wellness of individuals and communities. Care to the Community means that throughout western Colorado we need to provide access and quality care to those who need it, in better ways than ever before. There is a genuine effort being made to teach the organization, the Mesa County community and the healthcare system throughout western Colorado how to do this better through integration and cooperation among medical, first responder and mental healthcare providers. It's a pretty simple approach.

Mind Springs Health is the largest provider of mental health services on the Western Slope and they assist individuals and families with behavioral and mental health needs to deal with substance abuse issues also. They are the second largest mental health agency in Colorado. 557 employees and actively recruiting licensed providers and all kinds of positions. Now the highest paying organization in Grand Junction for nurses. Raised salaries of mental health technicians to a base of \$20/hr. and a range up to \$25/hr. to incentivize quality of care and attract talent. Investing more in clinicians and physicians to provide 13 offices among 10 counties, the quality of care our communities deserve.

63,000 sf., inpatient, state of the art mental health hospital that has never really been adequately utilized. Too many patients linger in Emergency Rooms and then get transferred to Denver when they could be getting the quality care they need right here in their own communities of western Colorado and at the West Springs hospital here in Grand Junction.

In residential care, we have a program where a mother can have children with her in a care program.

According to NAMI (National Alliance on Mental Illness), in the US roughly 25% of adults have some kind of mental health issue annually. About 10% have a sever mental health concern each year. In prevalence, suicide is now the #2 cause of death among adults age 20-34. We lose a veteran to suicide about every 10 minutes in this country. Approximately 75% of the issues leading to adult crisis are present before the age of 21.

In the US we do a horrible job of treating children and identifying mental health concerns early to prevent such struggles as adults. Trauma is another reason people fall into crisis is untreated trauma, mentally. PTSD is a deadly disease. Those who have untreated PTSD and are going through life just trying to "white knuckle" it through daily life, there's a high likelihood they are art risk for suicide. This is a health care crisis in this country.

Regarding his new role at Mind Springs John said this: "My job is to take a struggling organization that is potentially a jewel for this community - there are resources here that are not in place in other communities - particularly in Grand Junction, we have the mental health hospital, a large outpatient center, a full continuum of care. We just need to do a better job of delivering that care. My commitment to you (western Colorado) is that we are getting to work on that. In order to change the trajectory of the health of this community. To get this community healthier in mental wellness, we have to do a better job of deploying the resources this community helped to build. And take feedback from the community as well." The Platinum Rule includes understanding and delivering care the way our patients and the community want to receive it.
