# Nathan Souder, Superintendent, **Colorado National Monument**

Nathan Souder was named superintendent of Colorado National Monument in September 2019. Souder has worked for the National Park Service for more than 16 years, most recently as the superintendent of De Soto National Memorial in Bradenton, Florida. His first job in a national park was as a bellman at Many Glaciers Hotel at Glacier National. After discovering his passion for national parks, Souder worked the next two summers as a backcountry ranger in Rocky Mountain National Park before graduating from Indiana University. Souder has worked in Washington D.C. with the NPS Office of Legislative and Congressional Affairs and the Intermountain Regional Office. Before going to De Soto National Monument and then coming to the Colorado National Monument, Souder was in Jacksonville, Florida to serve as an Urban

#### **Program:**

Sharon Woodward introduced our speaker, Kurtis Minder, CEO and founder of GroupSence, leading provider in digital rick solutions

Kurtis Minder started by telling a story about camping with his new girlfriend and having to spend the whole time negotiating online with Russian cybercriminals. Not a great way to start a relationship.

He went from there to discuss on how companies get hacked all the time, their data is stolen and then they are ransomed to get their data back. He discussed how many small companies and non-profits are starting to get hit by these

highly organized Russian (predominately) ransomware groups. This scam dates to when computers still used floppy discs (though it was not very effective yet). The ransomware industry started growing in 2010 when the dark web was developed and cryptocurrency started becoming available. Plus, most computers were linked to the internet.

Kurtis walked us through what the ransom experience might be. He showed the communication we might get from the ransomware group. They will tell you not to modify or move files (actually good advice since the Ransomware software is not that good and it will break your fields). It also tells you not to use a third-party software to stop the ransom attack (good advice because such software does not exist and those who claim to sell you such software is a scam). Also, it will tell you not to reboot the computer because it will also damage your computer. Then, the message will tell you how to communicate with the hackers and eventually pay them. It is hard to get the bad guys because they have been given amnesty by nations such as Russia. The good news is that basic cyber hygiene can prevent being hacked and ransomed. To help small businesses, he launched the non-profit GroupSence. He did this is partnership with CMU.
