Ken Mabery led us in the Pledge of Allegiance to our flag.



Barbara reported that the Fruita Rotary Club had pledged \$500 in support of the STRIVE Picnic (returning after three years) at the Botanical Gardens. Not to be outdone, our club raised more than \$2,400 in a matter of minutes! We'll see now if any of the remaining Valley clubs step up to challenge

Dale Beede (a CU alum) offered 4 tickets to the Buffs spring game at Folsom Field last Saturday in Boulder. The game was a sellout and Coach Prime (new HC Deion Sanders) was the main attraction.

Bobbie Daniel introduced our speaker Dalida **Bollig**, the Chief Executive Officer of the Grand Junction Business Incubator Center. The Business Incubator Center (BIC) is a 501(c)(3) non-profit organization that for more vanilla from his trip to Puerto Vallarta. than a quarter century has been supporting the launch, growth, stabilization, and longterm success of business enterprises in Mesa County and the surrounding region. Our goal







is to stimulate the local economy and retain/ create the greatest number of sustainable jobs possible.

Founded in 1987 as part of initiatives to diversify the economy after the 1982 economic bust, BIC was funded with a \$75,000 grant from the department of local affairs. The Small Business Development Center opened an office at BIC in 1993 to provide classes, workshops, and business coaching. BIC moved to its current 46 acre location in 1999. increasing total square footage to 60,000 square feet, with over 35,000 square feet of mixed use space available for lease to tenant clients of BIC.

At any given time, BIC has 50-65 tenants and works with more than 1,000 clients each year. In the more than a quarter century BIC has been in existence we have graduated in excess of 250 companies from our facility with a greater than 80% existence rate after 5 years, helped launch nearly 600 companies which generated more than \$157 million in revenues, created/retained over 9,451 jobs, made over 360 loans, leveraged more than \$71 million in capital, and as administrators of the Mesa County Enterprise Zone, issued more than 7,000 certifications resulting in hundreds of thousands of dollars in tax credits and tens of millions of capital investments, as well as averaging nearly \$5 million in contribution projects for charitable organizations per year

D51 Tree Planting—May 5th

As spring begins to fill the air, we are getting closer to the opportunity to plant trees at some Mesa Valley County School District #51 schools. To recap, this is a project the Evening Group has sponsored. The idea was born with Brian Bray. He wanted us to expand the Club's tradition of planting trees to some of the area schools. They took that idea to D51 and it has blossomed. The Evening Group raised \$5,000 for the project, Rotary District 5470 matched that with an additional \$5,000 and School District #51 has pitched in an additional \$2,000. With that money, 40 to 50 trees are being purchased (trees that are a bit more mature than saplings) and on May 5th, they will be planted at eight different schools. On May 5th, we will need volunteers to help plant the trees at two of the schools—Appleton Elementary and Orchard Mesa Middle

School. The planting will be at two different times so you can volunteer to help at both sites if you wish. The exact times are still to be announced but get your shovels ready and save the date.
