Our Morning Song, Inspirational Message, or Rotary History: Harry Ruggles joined Paul Harris as the fifth member of Rotary club in Chicago in 1905. Harry enjoyed singing, and at an early meeting of the group, he stood on a chair and urged everyone to join him in a song. Soon afterward, group singing soon became a traditional part of each Rotary meeting. Our club cheerfully continues to follow this tradition! We may also share an inspirational message or a small piece of Rotary News or Rotary History at this time.

Happy Dollars: Making attempts each day to think of positive things helps to train your brain to think positively on a regular basis. During Happy Dollars, we ask each person to think about and describe something they are happy for in the following or upcoming week. The \$1 they contribute while sharing this happy thought goes to our Rotary Club's General Fund which is used for operating expenses and charitable causes.

Raffle: Tickets are one ticket for \$1, 3 tickets for \$2, 5 tickets for \$3, 7 tickets for \$4 and 10 tickets for \$5. These donations go toward funding our local College Scholarship Fund. If your ticket is drawn, you get one spin of the Bingo letters. If "B1" is selected, you win half of the accumulated pot and the other half goes into the Scholarship Fund.

The Rotary Four-Way Test: One of the most widely printed and quoted statements of business ethics in the world is the Rotary "Four-Way Test." It was created by Rotarian Herbert J. Taylor in 1932. The Four-Way Test became the guide for sales, production, advertising and all relations with dealers and customers, and the survival of the company was credited to this simple philosophy. The Four-Way Test was adopted by Rotary in 1943 and has been translated into more than 100 languages and published in thousands of ways. We recite the Four-Way Test at each meeting.

Of the things we think, say or do:

- 1) Is it the TRUTH?
- 2) Is it FAIR to all concerned?
- 3) Will it build GOODWILL and BETTER FRIENDSHIPS?
- 4) Will it be BENEFICIAL to all concerned?
