PRESIDENTS REPORT

2022 - 2023



This time last year I stood up here and set out ten goals that I wanted our club to achieve in my presidential year. Some of these goals were quite ambitious, while others seemed relatively simple at the time. Well, the report card is in. How well did we do? I will run through each individual goal and give an overall grade at the end:

1. Have at least one invited guest (potential member) attend the club meeting each week

We started out like a house on fire with this one. By the 15th December we had inducted 3 new, highly motivated members. Then the wheels fell off to some degree, despite some goading by me. In the end we invited 13 guests out of a possible 30 available meetings. This was one of the ambitious goals, but an extremely important issue if our club is to survive in the long term. We currently have 38 active members, plus one honorary member, according to our website. Active members will drop to about 33 in this new year as several will not be renewing with our club in 2023-24.

2. Invite the Rotaract Club of Adelaide University to Port Pirie

This morphed into inviting the Rotaract club of Adelaide Peace, due to me contacting Lenard Sciangelopore (his phone number was still on the Adelaide Uni website). Various discussions were entered into only for the visit to fall over at the last moment. They had to cancel the trip, so I will take our attempts as a win, as we did all we could to achieve this goal.

3. Work on an event or project with the John Pirie Secondary School

The aim here was to revitalise the Interact Club. There was some success in the end as our club helped in raising funds via a BBQ for a school group to travel to Cambodia later in the year. Interactors were invited to come along and assist us with the BBQ.

4. Arrange a joint project for women or girls with the local Soroptimist Club

Thanks to the efforts of Pam Menadue we met with president Trish Rollins and ended up negotiating a project whereby \$1,500 was donated by our club to allow the purchase of about ten starter kits for moving the homeless into accommodation. These kits include kitchen and cleaning items that the person in question would not otherwise have to move into their house.

5. Arrange a joint meeting or event with the Rotary Club of Peterborough

Several attempts were made to do something here. Eventually it was decided to assist Peterborough with one of their projects, namely the driver education project. Our club will be donating funds to assist Peterborough in building a garage to store the driver education vehicle they use for this project. The amount is yet to be determined, but this is an excellent outcome because, not only are we assisting a sister club, but we are also helping the youth of Peterborough in obtaining their drivers licenses.

6. Pursue an environmental project in the area

We initially envisaged trying to do something out at Telowie Beach for this goal, but bureaucratic red tape got in the way. We did, however, manage to liaise with the Port Pirie Regional Council and have agreed to a long-term project greening the Port Pirie Wetlands area. The initial step will be to assist in establishing a bush tucker garden at the Wetlands entrance off of Wandereah Road. The plan is to work in conjunction with the John Pirie Secondary School and the Warndu Group from Clare. We will be meeting regularly with Kathryn Johnson at the council to see this to fruition. After this we will continue to work through other areas of the Wetlands over the coming years.

7. Set up a working party to review and update the club strategic plan

We conducted a survey of members to get their thoughts on what they would like the club to do in the future. Barry Mudge has “volunteered” to collate this information and a working group of six Rotarians has been established to see this goal through. It is hoped that we will be able to report back to the club early in the new Rotary year..

8. Revive the Rotary Youth Exchange program within the club

I am pleased to announce that, barring any last-minute issues, we will have an outbound exchange student for the 2024 calendar year. We have also been trying to liaise with our district to host an inbound exchange student from July but have yet to achieve this.

9. Formalise “Friends of Rotary”

The idea here was to unlock more volunteers to assist the club in carrying out some of our activities during the year. Member application forms have been created for necessary information to be uploaded into ClubRunner. We have set a zero membership fee, and Dannielle Camporeale has created flyers to encourage prospective members to join. Informally we already have three Friends of Rotary.

10. Publish redacted board minutes in the Bulletin

It was decided early on that the minutes would be emailed, or hand delivered to members, rather than including in the bulletin. I would have thought that this goal would have been the easiest to achieve, but no, this was a fail as the minutes were rarely sent out.

Overall, I graded the club a B+ (8 out of 10), leaving room for improvement. I will continue to quietly push towards fully implementing the above goals in the current year.

In other news, the club has continued to fundraise through the many BBQs, quiz nights, bowls nights, football gates, business directory and other events throughout the year. Well done to all those involved in these events.

As previously mentioned, we inducted three new members this year – Marilyn Hayman, David “Bomber” Brown and Rory Good. These guys have settled into the club well and will continue to be great members of our club going forward.

Other achievements include the success of the Lentil Project. A big thank you goes to Barry & Kristina Mudge for their generous donation. Barry deserves mention for his inventive abilities and his culinary efforts as well. We also erected new stable fencing at Riding for Disabled.

We have started to utilise Clubrunner, thanks to the efforts of Roger Crouch in getting this up and running.

We had two club members attend the international conference in Melbourne during May. The club will be looking forward to a detailed report on that event in the near future. Two members also attended the District Expo, also held in May.

The club also made significant donations to shelter box and the Ukrainian Humanitarian Crisis during the year.

We continue to support youth through our student citizen awards to the region’s secondary schools, as well as sponsorship for the Gladstone High School Road Safety Day.

The club has implemented a \$5000 grant scheme for local community clubs to apply to in relation to upcoming projects they may have. This will be advertised extensively in the new year.

We were involved in a Global Grant, the details of which will no doubt be covered by John Rowe in his Foundation Report. I would also like to congratulate and thank those members who continue to support the Foundation through their donations to the Centurion Club and Paul Harris Society.

During the year we lost Owen Crocker who served as President in the 2006-07 year. Owen was also our Webmaster for many years and was instrumental in producing the club’s annual reports. He will be sadly missed.

I would like to thank the Sergeants at Arms Pam Menadue, Chris Keane, Dennis Coad, Stephen Lynch, Rob Tolson and Philip Johns for their efforts this year. Thank you again to Stephen for his role as Bulletin Editor, and to Chris who took on the unenviable job of Football Gate Roster manager.

I would also like to thank my board, Dieter Lunsmann, Peter Richens, Peter Stanley, Barry Mudge, Roger Crouch, Greg Hudson, Dannielle Camporeale, John Rowe, Rob Hosking and Barbara Camporeale for their efforts in making the past Rotary year a success. Barbara came onto the board when Rob Hosking moved overseas, while Dieter was also responsible for organising our guest speakers during the year and did a great job.

Finally, I wish incoming president Dieter and his board all the best for 2023-2024. I have no doubt that the club is in good hands.

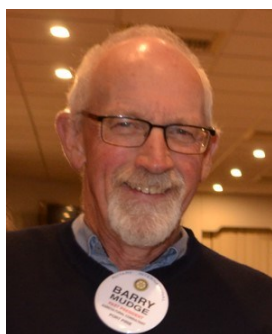

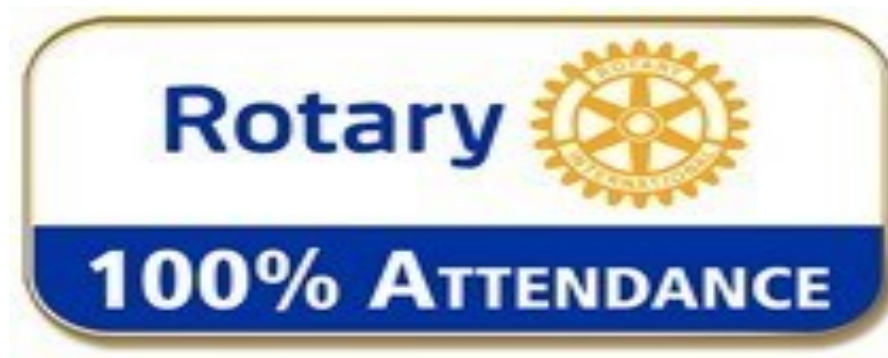

Lentil Project

An initiative of PP Barry Mudge, the Lentil Project was a project which supplied fresh lentils to UCSA Food Hub and the Food Bank. Approximately 800kg of lentils were donated to the Club by a Rotarian and were then bagged and distributed by members to provide an exciting opportunity for low priced meal options for people accessing the services of these organisations. Each bag was labelled to promote the Club. This outstanding project was well received by the community, with positive feedback offering future opportunities for the Club to make a difference in our communities.



Vocational Training Team

A grant application for District Designated funds for US\$16,660 and a Foundation Global Fund application for US\$30,006 has been submitted to support five Moroccan agricultural scientists to travel to Metro and Regional SA to study dry land adaptation of agricultural systems under climate change. Visiting for three weeks in September, the scientists will have the opportunity to travel to Adelaide and Regional SA, meeting with local farmers and agricultural leaders to develop strategies to improve rain-fed agricultural productivity in Morocco, upon approval of both grants.

The application process has been completed and the interview process has commenced. A Quiz Night was held in October, raising funds for our local community projects and was well attended by approximately 60 people at the Port Pirie Royal Yacht Club.

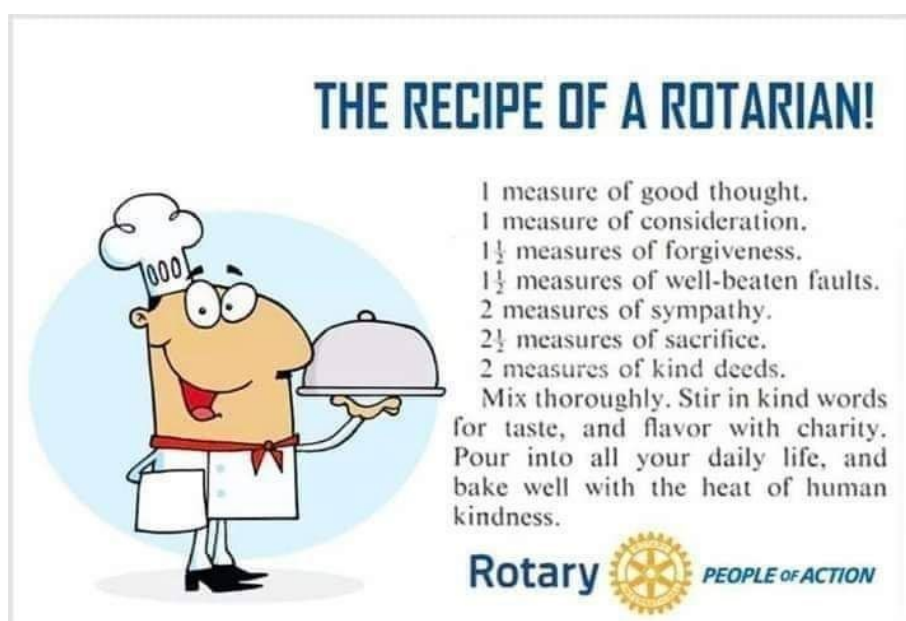

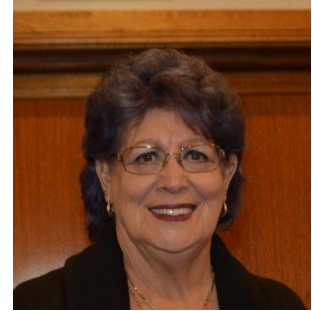

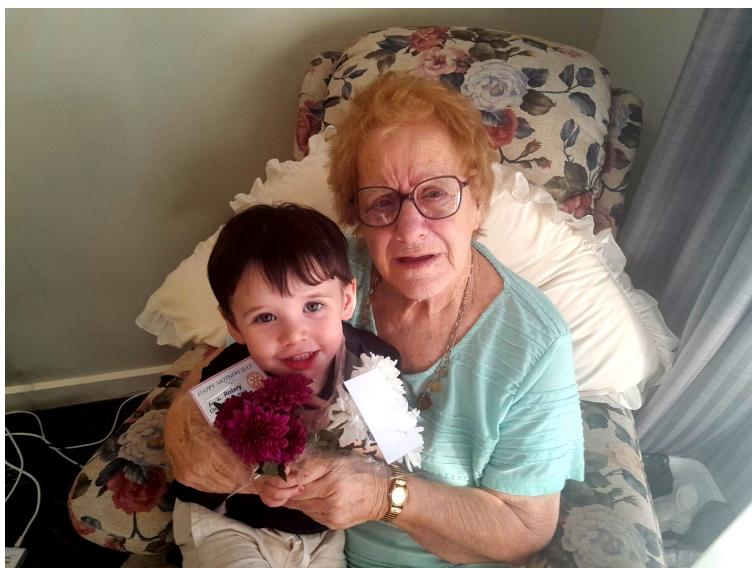
Adelaide University Rotoract Club

Community Development - Renovation

The Rotary Club of DAU in Pampanga province of the Philippines received a request from a school for help to refurbish a toilet block and hand washing facilities at the Dapdap Elementary School located at Madapdap Resettlement Area in Mabalacat City, Pampanga 1st District.

The Rotary Club of Port Pirie decided to facilitate the project by joining with our Sister Club and to sponsor the project. We were successful in applying for a Rotary Foundation District Grant, to support the project.

The refurbishment included replacement of part of the roof with new galvanized iron, replacement of 4 toilet pans, taps and fittings. Electrical repairs, including installation of electrical safety breaker and light fittings.

The new toilet pans were installed without flushers as the children play around with them and break the fittings. A bucket and pan are used as substitutes. Water is supplied in each toilet via a tap. The missing floor traps were replaced.

The missing wall tiles were replaced and the building was repainted yellow with green doors and trim. The galvanized roof was painted green.

The completed project was commissioned with the formal handover on 18th March 2023.

Global Grant 234829

Provision of a Water System for Bartangay Poblacion, Kabayan, Dutab (Chuntug and Opdas) in the Philippines.

This joint project between the RC of Baguio and RC of Port Pirie is for the rehabilitation of the water distribution system destroyed by Typhoon Ompong, and provide water to the Kabayan Poblacion with 500 inhabitants including an Elementary School and a Parish Church.

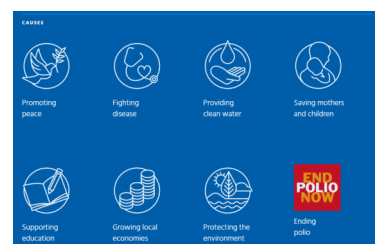
This project will facilitate universal and equitable access to safe and affordable drinking water to a population of approximately 1000 individuals.

Past President Alberto Talco of RC of Baguio, Rito Deaban of the Dutab Water Association and the Barangay Captain Ervin Busilan are the responsible personnel for this project.

The grant for US\$52,000 has just been approved by the Foundation. Our contribution has been US\$15,000. (District Designated Funds from the Foundation.)

This project was begun in early 2022 and has taken considerable effort to satisfy the requirements of The Rotary Foundation. The project includes an educational unit on health and hygiene.

The project will be completed in the 2023-24 Rotary Year. The final Report will be included in next year's Annual Report.
