

Object of Rotary

The Object of Rotary is to encourage and foster the ideal of service as a basis of worthy enterprise and, in particular, to encourage and foster:

FIRST. The development of acquaintance as an opportunity for service;

SECOND. High ethical standards in business and professions, the recognition of the worthiness of all useful occupations, and the dignifying of each Rotarian's occupation as an opportunity to serve society;

THIRD. The application of the ideal of service in each Rotarian's personal, business, and community life;

FOURTH. The advancement of international understanding, goodwill, and peace through a world fellowship of business and professional persons united in the ideal of service.

Five Avenues of Service

Based on the Object of Rotary, the Four Avenues of Service are Rotary's philosophical cornerstone and the foundation on which club activity is based:

- **Club Service** focuses on strengthening fellowship and ensuring the effective functioning of the club.
- **Vocational Service** encourages Rotarians to serve others through their vocations and to practice high ethical standards.
- **Community Service** covers the projects and activities the club undertakes to improve community life.
- **International Service** encompasses actions taken to expand Rotary's humanitarian reach around the globe and to promote world understanding and peace.
- **New Generations Service** recognizes youth and young adults through leadership development activities.

The Four-Way Test

From the earliest days of the organization, Rotarians were concerned with promoting high ethical standards in their professional lives. One of the world's most widely printed and quoted statements of business ethics is The Four-Way Test, which was created in 1932 by Rotarian Herbert J. Taylor (who later served as RI president) when he was asked to take charge of a company that was facing bankruptcy.

"Of the things we think, say or do:

Is it the TRUTH?

Is it FAIR to all concerned?

Will it build GOODWILL and BETTER FRIENDSHIPS?

Will it be BENEFICIAL to all concerned?"

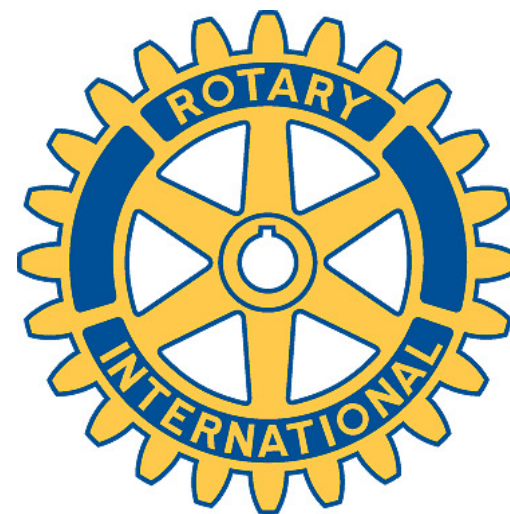

***Rotary**, the world's first service organization, began with the formation of the Rotary Club of Chicago, Illinois USA on February 23, 1905. The club was started by a young lawyer, Paul P. Harris and three of his friends. They wished to recapture the friendly spirit they had felt among business people in the small towns in which they had previously lived. Their weekly meetings "rotated" among their offices, providing the new service club with its name. Today Rotary flourishes with some 33,000 clubs, and over 1.2 million men and women as club members providing community service in 166 countries.*

WHAT DO WE EXPECT FROM YOU? WE'LL WANT YOU TO:

- Attend weekly meetings at least 60% of the time.
- Participate on at least one club committee.
- Pay quarterly \$75 dues and pay for meals.
- Take part in at least one community service project annually.
- Contribute to club fundraisers, both financially and with your time.

If you attend 60% of Rotary meetings annually (31 meetings/year), pay dues and support club fundraisers, your financial obligation will be approximately \$800 per year. Many Rotary expenses qualify as business expense or charitable contributions; check with your accountant.
