The East Alton Boys' and Girls' Club was established in 2007 and meets in East Alton Middle School. It was begun through NCLB funding when EA Middle was placed on the "watch list." Through the efforts of the club, the school has gone from watch list to Honor Roll.

The B&G club has accomplished this success through its after-school program. The program is available to any student for three hours after school each day. During the three hours, students receive tutoring and homework help as well as fun and free time. Currently, there are approximately 75 children in the program. Even during the summers, the B & G club has field trips on Fridays. Occasionally, through special grants, the children are even able to attend special events, like the show, "Beauty and the Beast" at the Fox.

Unfortunately, since the school is no longer on the watch list, government funding will be reduced to 0 next year. School administration and Diane and Mary are working together to try to raise necessary funds to continue.
