Can You Dig It?

Last time we gathered, Sue's guest was Mary Crawford from the Center for American Archeology in Kampsville, II. Mary said that Archeologists are "scientists on a mission." The mission ilcludes research, education, public outreach, and cultural stewardship. The CAA in Kampsville is celebrating its 60th anniversary this year.

Mary showed slides and discussed the Koster site in Green county. In that dig, archeologists have systematically revealed 9000 years of history. Working with groups of all ages, the CAA works to investigate sites throughout the lower Mississippi valley and to preserve artifacts and history for future generations. Using classic techniques, digging and sifting, and modern global satellite mapping and ground penetrating radar, the CAA is uncovering the history of the mid-west, which was one of the last places on the earth to be populated.

Pre-historically, each mile of the Mississippi, could support 300 people. These people left behind pottery, bone tools, jewelery, even evidence of domesticated dogs.

The CAA is there to **C**reate new programs and partnerships, **A**ctivate for equal educational opportunities, and **A**chieve excellence in research and education. You may visit them as caa-archeology.org.

The Power of Clean Water

Early each morning, the students of Escuela Oficial Rural Mixta in El Tunino, Guatemala, trek down the mountainside on their way to school. They carry the essentials for the day: books, backpacks, and class projects. But one other item they used to haul from home is thankfully absent: a bucket of clean water.

The community of El Tunino is part of Sumpango, a rural region where access to clean running water is limited. Schools in the area offered the basics in education, but students learned quickly that drinking water and working toilets were not part of the curriculum. Today, that lesson is very different.

Using a global grant, the Rotary Club of Guatemala Sur, along with clubs in the United States, have provided washing stations and latrines, as well as kitchen equipment and furniture for this school and eight others in Sumpango. Jorge Luis Chiquito, principal of Escuela Oficial Rural Mixta, says the availability of clean water and sanitation have had a significant impact on his students. With fewer illnesses caused by polluted water, the students are absent from school less and able to concentrate on their studies more.

"Having a handwashing station and new latrines has made a huge difference," he says. "We now have a better way of life for our students and their families, thanks to the help we received from Rotary."

Clubs in Belize, Guatemala, and Honduras, all part of District 4250, sponsored 43 global grants, five of which were led by the Guatemala Sur club. Providing clean water was one of the club's top priorities.

"Everything begins with water," says Jorge Aufranc, past governor of District 4250 and a member of the Guatemala Sur club. "If there is no water, we cannot have peace. Where there is a lack of water, there is conflict."
