# Comptrol Freak!

Last week, Chris introduced the club to Matt Rice from the state comptroller's office. The Illinois state comptroller is Judy Barr Topinka and she is the chief financial officer for the state. The primary responsibility of the comptroller's office is to pay bills for the state and to oversee the fiscal integrity of the state.

Currently, there are about 120,000 bills backlogged in the comptroller's office amounting in about \$5.2 billion in obligations. Payments from the state are delayed about ninety days which is an improvement on their 120 day tradition.

Chris talked about several initatives that Judy's office has championed to amplify efficiency and transparency. Using direct deposit for state checks saves the state \$1 mill. annually. The website also gives anyone access to 'the ledger' so that we can see how our dollars are spent. We can also see there quarterly financial reports for the state and financial statements for all state entities in the "warehouse."

The comptroller's office offers several programs targeted at improving the financial health of the state. They offer Consumer Affairs presentations to High Schools and other groups to discuss budgeting, credit cards, and identity theft. They also work with local governments to help with collections of delinquent bills. The Power Program helps minorities and small businesses to connect with state contracts including women, veterans, and minority-owned business. But Hewko, a charter member of the Rotary Club of Kyiv, Ukraine, is so committed to Rotary's mission that he takes things a step further. He's immunized children against polio in India, represented Rotary at the World Economic Forum, and bicycled 111 miles to raise money for polio eradication during both the 2012 and 2013 El Tour de Tucson in Arizona. Hewko and Rotarians raised \$730,000 for polio eradication during this year's ride, which was dedicated to Hewko. "It was an incredible honor to accept the 2013 Dedication Award on behalf of Rotary and friends."
