Reach Within to Embrace Humanity

Lemons to Lemonade

One of the great problems in the Mississippi river and tributaries has been the invasion of Asian Carp. These fish crowd out the native fish and are taking over the waterways from the Great Lakes to the Gulf of Mexico. The Army Corps of Engineers has been tasked with the responsibility of controlling this invasive species and designing ways to keep them from expanding their



range. Millions of dollars have been committed to the task, but every effort has little effect.

Enter Grafton, Illinois. Dave's guest, Grafton mayor, Tom Thompson spoke of how their village developed a different response. Recognizing that the carp are plankton-eaters making them rich in Omega 3 oils, and that they are in high demand in Asia, where they no longer live wild, but are farm-raised, and that they are good to eat, except for their bones, business leaders in Grafton began to imagine catching and selling the carp to China.

After several years of development, Grafton now has an Asian Carp facility in the works that will employ thirty people plus fisherman in a no-waste process. They currently have an order for 35 million pounds to be delivered to China over the next three years.

Mayor Thompson's keys to success:

- 1. Take a leap of faith rather than huddle in fear.
- 2. Look on people with respect
- 3. Listen to your heart.
