### Mission to the Needy



Most of us would not think of Long Island as a place that was struggling financially and working hard to respond to the needs of its rapidly growing youth population, but that is exactly what is taking place in Long Island, The Bahamas. Last week, Greg Harp, associate pastor at Wood River First Assembly of God told the club about a mis-

sion trip that he recently took to Long Island. While we tend to think of the Bahamas as a tropical paradise filled with resorts and beaches, the reality is far from blissful. Long Island is located away from the splendor of Nassau and suffers from poor schools, scarce resources, and governmental indifference. As is common in similar situations, the church is looking for ways to respond to the needs of the people. One way to respond is to build a youth center that will serve as a gathering place for the 800 youth on this Island that is 80 miles long and less than 1 mile wide at its narrowest point. Once the youth center is built, the next task will be to provide transportation to the location through donated school busses. Another project that is being initiated is the purchase of solar desalinization plants to provide fresh water to the residents of the island and teaching the residents to use hydroponic gardening to grow fresh vegetables. Naturally, the only thing needed is money, but God is working for the youth of Long Island.



Prom season is in full swing. The time of year when girls in gowns and boys in badlystay out past curfew, and pose

awkwardly for pictures.

So, here's a short history of the prom:

- First, the word "prom" is short for promenade, the French word for walk. It refers to the formal, introductory parade of guests at a party. That's also why there's a Promenade Deck on a cruise ship—because it's designed for walking.
- The prom as a gathering can be traced back to the 1800's to the simple co-ed banquets held by universities for each year's graduating class.
- By the 1940's, they had morphed into the dances we see today.
- In the 1950's the economy was in great shape, so high

schools stopped holding proms in school gymnasiums and moved them to fancy hotels and country clubs.

- In 1975, President Ford's daughter held her high school's senior prom at the ultimate party venue: the White House.
- The prom has continued to evolve. In 1994, a school principal in Alabama was sued for threatening to cancel the prom if interracial couples were allowed to attend.
- Also, going stag— which • used to be considered social suicide-has become the in thing to do.
