## Biofuels Are Making a Difference Reach Within to Embrace Humanity

Our speaker last week, John Calpert, was the guest of Mark S. and came from the national Corn to Ethanol Research Center at SIUE. This center opened in 2003 with a mission to facilitate the development on new technologies for the advancement of biofuels.

Current national policy calls for 36 billion gallons of renewable fuels to be produced nationally by 2020. This year, 14 billion gallons were produced, displacing 400 million barrels of foreign oil. The ethanol industry adds \$5 billion to the economy of Illinois annually and \$60 billion to the national economy.

The research center is funded through the private sector and has aided in the advancement of many research efforts in the biofuels industry. They have been the first to convert cellulos to corn alcohol, marking a breakthrough in the technology.

John made the point that our food supply is not reduced at all through use as biofuels and that our dependence on foreign oil has consistently been reduced through these efforts. He predticts a bright future for the American biofuels industry.
