Mary welcomed our guests, Bryan Weitzel from a Rotary club in Colorado, and Judith Horstman, a friend of Peggy's.

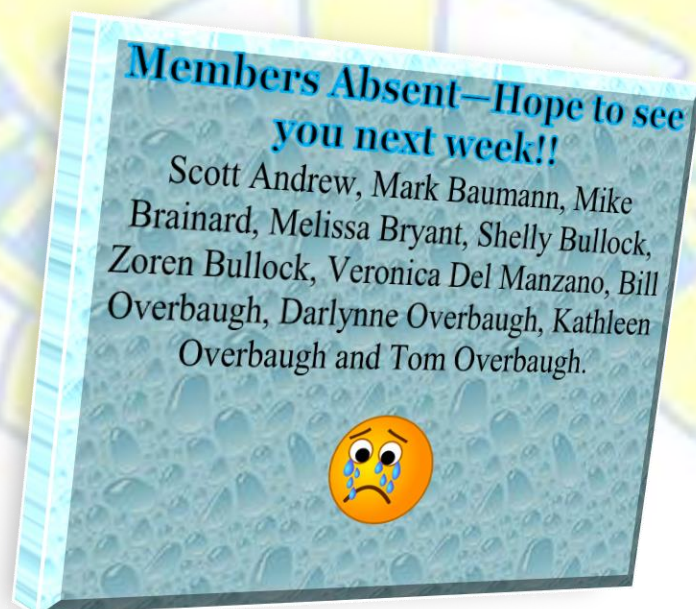
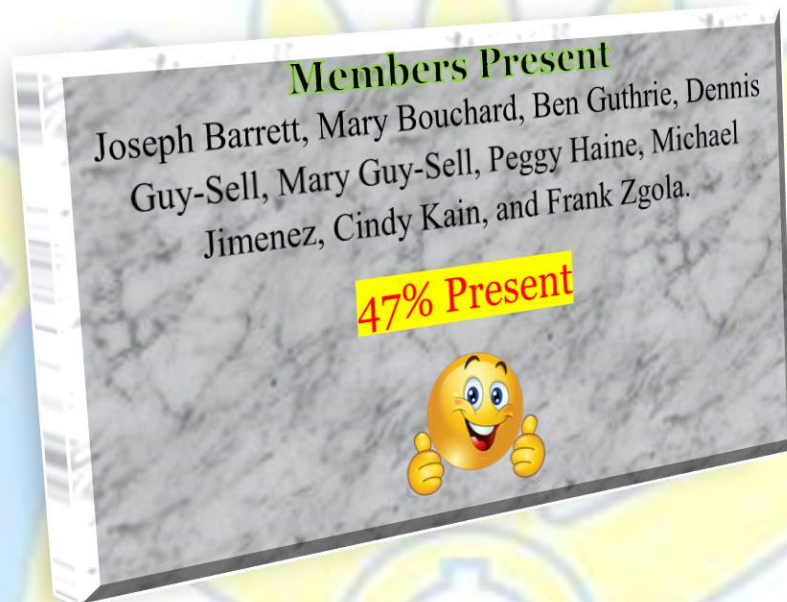
