MAGAZINE REPORT



The Rotary Club of Warren was pleased to welcome Visiting Rotarian, Pamela Gorvet from Austintown, and Amy Phillips' guest (and first egg customer!), Jill Anderson, to this week's meeting.

Following introductions, Lauren Kramer presented her review of the April issue of *Rotary*. First, Lauren informed us that the Rotary Club of Broomfield, Colorado is offering a chance to win a fully restored 1967

Turn to page 11 and you'll find the article that the bulk of Lauren's presentation focused on - Climate Smarts. This article is written by a member of the Rotary E-club of Washington District 9999 who practices regenerative agriculture. In this method, nutrients are restored to the soil. This helps to feed her region's growing population "in the least resource-intensive way possible". The author, Angela TenBroeck, combines growing on land with aquaponics, a technique of raising plants from seed to harvest alongside fish, using a fraction of the land used in traditional farming. The fish waste acts as a fertilizer for crops.

TenBroeck has shared her expertise with people all over the world, most recently in the South Sudan. There, she helped develop farms in partnership with a local health care organization through the non-profit she started, the Center for Sustainable Agricultural Excellence and Conservation. In addition, she represented Rotary at the COP28 climate summit, where she taught fellow Rotarians that farming can save water,

people, and the planet.

Lauren encouraged us to check out some of these events highlighted in Our World: People of Action Around the Globe on pages 16 and 17 of April's edition of *Rotary*.

PROGRAM:

<u>AMY PHILLIPS,</u> <u>SUNSHINE GOLDEN ACRES</u>

After working at General Motors as a Paint Specialist for 25 years, Amy Phillips was diagnosed as having thyroid cancer and benign reoccurring liver tumors. 80% of her liver and her thyroid were surgically removed. Due to her medical issues, she took a buyout from GM, became a landlord, and bought a farm in order to get her mind off of her health issues and give herself a purpose in life. That was the start of Sunshine Golden Acres.

On her farm, she had three barns and some chickens. Amy bought a pregnant goat and a buddy for her, and she made goat milk soap as a hobby. She later opened an Etsy store, and her soap sold like crazy! She also began to make other products like lotions, fudge, caramels, ice cream, cheese, butter, etc.

After buying a building on Mahoning Avenue in Warren, Amy started to offer soap making classes on the last two Sundays of each month and opened a soap store and goat milk farmer's market. Her soap making classes offer the full farm experience – lunch, the opportunity to milk the goats, collect chicken eggs, and use soap molds and cutters. Her first farmer's market was held on April 7th of this year, and she now has vendors lined up through October. The Farmer's Market will run on the first Sunday of the month from May through July, and on the first and third Sunday of each month from August through October. A special activity will occur as part of the market each month.

Amy now ships her soap to all 50 states, and she makes over 50 scents. The top sellers are Oatmeal Honey, Cherry Blossom and Lavender. She makes 500 bars of soap a week. The soap, which is made from raw filtered goat milk and oils, is moisturizing and good for all skin conditions. She has six employees in her soap studio, two ducks, 62 chickens, and eight goats. In addition to the products mentioned earlier, she sells delicious Amish donuts Thursdays through Saturdays.

Amy is married to her very first boyfriend, Stephen. They went their separate ways at age 15, but after Amy's divorce, they reunited and married in 2017. Amy's son Jared swims for Tampa and just received 6th place in the nation for the breaststroke! Her daughter Caitlyn graduated from The Ohio State University and also lives in Florida.

















TRIPLE JACKPOT
