

Ray Sinchak opened Fellowship this week with some good news and some bad news about April 17th. First, for the bad news - on April 17, 1961, a failed military landing operation by the Cuban Democratic Revolutionary Front occurred on the southwestern coast of Cuba, consisting of Cuban exiles who opposed Fidel Castro's Cuban Revolution. This operation, the Bay of Pigs invasion, was clandestinely financed and directed by the U.S. government.



On a more positive note, on this day

in 1970, after a six-day mission, Apollo 13, which had survived an explosion of an oxygen tank two days after launch, returned to Earth safely with the whole crew on board. The explosion had robbed their Command Module of power and oxygen, and the astronauts had to take refuge in the Lunar Module Aquarius and judiciously conserve their resources in order to stay alive!

Next, Ray reminded us that two weeks ago, he had shared the story of how Judy Garland became a star. Fast forward a decade and a half, and this week, Ray told us that Judy entered a period of ups and downs. In 1944, while she was dating Vincente Minelli, Judy starred in the musical, Meet Me in St. Louis, and introduced the song "Have Yourself a Merry Little Christmas". The song became an instant classic and went on to win an Academy Award for best original song.

Garland and Minelli married the following year, and Judy was later cast in the musical, *The Harvey Girls*, directed by George Sidney. On the day that they were shooting the big scene, Judy wasn't feeling too well. The assistant director found her in her trailor, lying on the couch with an ice pack on her head. He told Sidney, who eventually coaxed Judy into performing. Despite not feeling well, Judy showed up on stage, all dolled up, and her performance was perfect!

After the performance, back in her trailor, George Sidney thanked Garland for her performance. And that's show business, folks!

PROGRAM:

<u>MIKE WILSON</u> <u>AS RODNEY DANGERFIELD</u>



Warren Rotarian Mike Wilson of Champion, Ohio is the Director of SCOPE Senior Services with ten centers serving 4,000 senior citizens in Northeast Ohio. Mike began performing as the late great comedian Rodney Dangerfield five years ago. He has also presented President William McKinley all over our nation for over 30 years. After a performance as McKinley, he was asked if he could come back, but do someone funny.

Well, after feeling disrespected, he happened to watch a Johnny Carson video with Rodney Dangerfield. Now Mike brings Rodney back to life in his "No Respect" comedy tour. His biggest crowd to date was a group of doctors at NEOUCOM.

This week, Mike delighted fellow Warren Rotarians with his portrayal of Rodney Dangerfield. He had us in stitches with his jokes about physicians, health issues, and his wife, all of which, of course, were interjected with the famous quips, "What can I say" and "I don't get no respect"! Jack Roy (born Jacob Cohen but better known by the pseudonym Rodney Dangerfield) was an American stand-up comedian, actor, screenwriter and producer. At the age of 15, Dangerfield began to write for stand-up comedians while also performing at the Nevele, a resort in New York. He struggled financially for a while, and at one point, he took a job as an aluminum siding salesman. However, in the 1960s, he started reviving his career in show business. His self-deprecating one-liner humor and monologues grew in popularity, not only during his early career as a stand-up comedian, but also on talk shows during the 60s and 70s. He eventually became a headlining act in the Las Vegas casinos.

Dangerfield reached national prominence on television after appearing on The Ed Sullivan Show in 1967. He also was a regular on The Dean Martin Show and appeared on The Tonight Show more than 70 times. In 1969, he teamed up with a friend to build his own comedy club in New York City so that he didn't have to travel as often.

In 1980, a comedy album, No Respect, was produced and won a Grammy Award. In 1983, his "Rappin' Rodney" single became one of the first Hot 100 rap records, with an associated hit video on MTV. Throughout the 80s, he also appeared in commercials for Miller Lite beer, as well as various other music videos of stars like Billy Joel and Lionel Richie.

In 1995, Rodney Dangerfield was the first celebrity to personally own a website and create his own content for it. This led to him being named one of the "100 Most Influential People on the Web" by Websight magazine. He was also recognized by the Smithsonian Institute for his trademark white shirts and red ties.

Dangerfield appeared in comedy films, such as Caddyshack and Easy Money, but also in a rare dramatic role in Natural Born Killers.

Health issues throughout the early 2000s curtailed his career. On his 80th birthday in 2001, he suffered a stroke while performing stand-up comedy on *The Tonight Show*. He returned a year later, on his 81st birthday, to perform again. However, in 2003, he underwent brain surgery to improve blood flow in preparation for heart valve replacement surgery. The heart valve surgery took place in 2004.

Rodney Dangerfield died on October 5, 2004, following a month-long coma due to complications from the heart valve surgery. On the day of his death, the Joke of the Day on his website was, "I tell ya, I get no respect from anyone. I bought a cemetery plot. The guy said, 'There goes the neighborhood!" "There goes the neighborhood" was chosen by Dangerfield's wife as the epitaph on his headstone.


