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
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After Warren Rotarians were treated to a video of Gene Kelley crooning and dancing to Singin' in The Rain, we took a trip back to Hollywood with Ray Sinchak. Here's what he had to say:

"It was 1952 and four-time Oscar winning famed director, John Ford, was finally able to film a picture he had wanted to make for many years but previously wasn't able to get a movie studio to produce it. The studios thought the theme of the movie would not have good box office appeal, and it was also because Ford insisted that it be shot entirely in Ireland.

But, finally, Republic Pictures took a chance and gave John Ford the goahead. SP all the cast, crew and equipment made their way to a little

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village in the Republic of Ireland called Inishefree. And what they made was a wonderful picture with great performances by the cast and, just as important, the beautiful scenery of Ireland in Technicolor.

Them he and his wife went to their room, and the actors dozed off in the rockers. AS he woke and morning was coming soon, Mr. Morrison looked around, then went to the kitchen and opened the icebox and found eggs and bacon. So he took a large skillet, put some wood in the oven and cooked. After slicing a loaf of bread, he put the kettle on. AS the sun came up, the O'Leary's came out smelling the food and exclaimed, 'What's this', to which Mr. Morrison said, 'Well, since you wouldn't take money for helping us, I made you breakfast. Have a seat.' And he served them. All sat down and ate.

After getting directions, the actors started for the car, but Miss O'Hara came back to Mr. O'Leary and said, 'I just have to tell you, Mr. Morrison goes by the name John Wayne', and he said, 'You mean that actor fella who makes all those shoot-em up movies in the States?' Miss O'Hara replied, 'Yes, that's right.' Mr. O'Leary mused, 'Well, for an actor, he doesn't say very much, does he?' She replied, 'No, only when he has something to say.'

So as Miss O'Hara got to the car, Mr. O'Leary asked loudly, 'What's the name of the moving picture you're making?' And she replied, 'Why it's called The Quiet Man', and Mr. O'Leary with a smile uttered, 'The Quiet Man, the quiet man, Indeed."'

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PROGRAM: KIM MASSARY, NEOCAP



In the 1980s and '90s, judges began demanding more resources for provision of treatment for offenders, because prisons were increasing in population. Legislators began writing proposals for community-based, lock-down facilities where people could live and participate in treatment programming. Today, in 88 counties across Ohio, NEOCAP provides treatment to more than 7,000 offenders yearly. A male facility on Pine Avenue in Warren offers programming to 125 convicted felons who are at high risk for reoffending. The closest female facility is located in Painesville and houses 60 individual.

Individuals treated in these facilities have lived a criminal lifestyle and have anti-social thinking. They are unable to hold down employment, have poor problem solving abilities and lack life management skills. There is an absence of a positive family unit and good role models. Rather, they tend to associate with antisocial peers. They lack pro-social leisure activities and self-control. They have a need to manipulate and control

R \mathbf{R} E N \mathbf{R} others. A history of substance abuse, impaired moral reasoning, and a criminal record with past prison stays is also typical.

Offenders live in NEOCAP's facilities for four to six months. Monday through Friday, they are involved in treatment from 9 a.m. until 5 p.m. Groups cover topics such as thinking for a change, driving with care, community service and anger management. They are provided with case management, chemically dependent treatment, mental and physical health treatment, adult basic education, employment assistance and housing information. Saturdays and Sundays are leisure days where the individuals are given the opportunity to be outdoors, exercise, listen to presenters, watch TV, play games and have visitors. At the end of the treatment, their probation officers monitor their list of what needs to be accomplished. They can be on probation for five years.

75% of those going through treatment remain in the community. If they return to prison, they can be stepped down and sent to NEOCAP again.
