ROTARY CLUB OF WARREN PEACE POLE DEDICATION ON COURTHOUSE SQUARE

In 1955, The Peace Pole Project was started by Masahisa Goi in Japan. Being greatly affected by the destruction caused by WWII and the atomic bombs that fell on Hiroshima and Nagasaki, Mr. Goi dedicated his life to creating world peace. In a moment of inspiration and deep prayer, the Peace Message, "May Peace Prevail on Earth", came to him. Soon after, this message began to be inscribed on Peace Poles erected in various locations across Japan.

The Peace Pole Project was introduced to the United States in 1986, the International Year of Peace, when The World Peace Prayer Society opened its offices in San Francisco and New York. Today, Peace Poles are the most recognized international peace symbol in the world, with more than 200,000 Peace Poles standing in almost every country.


Peace and Conflict Resolution is one of Rotary International's seven areas of focus. Rotarians are encouraged to promote peace through service projects both globally and in local communities. As part of Warren Rotary's efforts to become a Peacebuilder Club, a committee was formed and tasked with the job of researching the Peace Pole movement, ordering the monument, and scoping out the best place to install it in our own community. This past week, the efforts of committee members John Esker, Kim Massary and Ray Thomas came to fruition. The Message of Peace was brought to our community with the dedication of a Peace Pole, near our club's other contributions to the city, on Courthouse Square.

As he shared his thoughts with those in attendance for the dedication ceremony, Committee Member John Esker told of our country's history which was full of division, crime, war and blood. Yet, he indicated that there is good in the world – kindness, charity and compassion – all of which give us hope to endure the hard times. While the path to peace is not for the faint of heart, John emphasized that we all have gifts that can be a beacon of light for others. So, let us resolve to be peacemakers and create a better city, country and world.

The Peace Pole was installed near the fountain on Courthouse Square, with a park bench next to it, allowing residents to spend some quiet time in meditation. The Peace Pole is inscribed with the Peace Message, "May Peace Prevail on Earth", in English, Spanish, Greek, Italian, Polish, German, Braille, and American Sign Language.
