



Ray Sinchak kicked off April Fellowship by explaining that April 3rd was designated as National Party Day! Ray said that the opposite of strife and war is not just peace. Parties also have goodness and optimism at the forefront. So, party on!!

Ray then introduced us to the Gumm sisters of Minnesota – Frances, Dorothy Virginia and Mary Jane. The sisters sang and danced in their home town accompanied by their mother on the piano. Their mom was a typical stage mother who took her children to Hollywood to seek their fortune.



While singing at MGM, the youngest sister, Frances, was a real standout and was signed to a contract. At the suggestion of comedian George Jessell to change her name to something more theatrical, the young performer adopted the name "Judy Garland". She initially performed in film shorts and other small parts here and there.

When MGM bought the rights to *The Wizard of Oz*, they originally wanted to cast Shirley Temple in the lead role. However, she was under contract with 20th Century Fox. Following unsuccessful negotiations, MGM settled for their own Judy Garland. Her performance of the song, "Over the Rainbow" earned Garland an Oscar at the 1940 Academy Awards.

The filming of *The Wizard of Oz* cost more than \$3 million. When television came along in the 1950s, MGM got CBS to air the film, and MGM received royalties. Every year thereafter, they made more and more money. However, all of the cast members got a flat rate – not a cent from the royalties, just immortalities!

COCKEYE BBQ & CREAMERY



Erik Hoover received classical training as a chef at Johnson & Wales University's Culinary School. He initially worked as a Sous Chef in a restaurant, where he fondly remembers Rotarians coming in for meetings once a month!

Erik has been self-employed since 1998. In 2015, Erik and his wife bought a building on the west side of Warren, rehabilitated it and opened Cockeye BBQ.

Erik's son, Max, started out his college career studying pre-med (biology) and later switched to education. After discovering that teaching just wasn't for him, he got involved in the family business. The Hoovers bought the house next door to the BBQ restaurant, razed it to expand their parking, and then built a small building to open a creamery in 2019, where Max makes and sells premium ice cream. Last year, they sold 10,000 gallons of ice cream! And three months ago, they went online and now have their ice cream on shelves of grocery stores and other retailers.

Their success has allowed Cockeye BBQ & Creamery to give back to the community. Sales from their seasonal flavors help to support local youth organizations. In addition, proceeds from pint sales of their "charity flavors" are given to non-profits like St. Vincent de Paul and Sleep in Heavenly Peace, to name a few.

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Max is a five year member of an organization of small ice cream manufacturers from California to New York. He attends a yearly convention, and for the past three years, he has won blue ribbon awards for his chocolate ice cream, which went through a sensory science review at Cornell. As a result, he has been named a Grand Master Ice Cream Maker.

So, where did the name "Cockeye BBQ" come from? Erik was born with a lazy eye and is also blind in that eye. At a competition in North Carolina, a competitor called him a "Cockeyed Yankee", and Erik decided to own it!

And what's next for the Hoover family? Cockeye Creamery has opened a new manufacturing plant in Warren. Their distribution company, the Edgar Joseph Group, is now ready to add additional outlets in 2024 and grow more partnerships with local grocery stores in the Valley. In addition, a pizza shop is being built, which will be run by Max's brother and is due to open this coming fall. On April 11th, the company will be conducting tours of the manufacturing facility and sharing more about the continued growth story of Cockeye Creamery. A press conference and media presentation will begin at 10:15 a.m.
