ROTARY THEME FOR FEBRUARY PEACEBUILDING AND CONFLICT PREVENTION



Peacebuilding is the development of constructive personal, group, and political relationships across ethnic, religious, class, national, and racial boundaries. It aims to resolve injustice in nonviolent ways and to transform the structural conditions that generate deadly conflict.

Reflect on all that Rotary has accomplished in their international peace efforts. Promote Rotary and our club in our community and engage others in our vision of doing good in the world.

As many of you know, Ted Stazak has a keen interest in history, so he kicked off Fellowship this month by researching events that occurred throughout history on February 7th. He found over 150 significant events that occurred on this day! The following are a few of his favorites:

* In 1940, Walt Disney's second feature length movie, "Pinocchio", premiered in New York City.

* In 1949, Joe DiMaggio became the first \$100,000 a year baseball player for the New York Yankees.

* Fast forward to 1962 when U.S. President JFK began the blockade of Cuba by banning all Cuban imports and exports.

* Just two years later, in 1964, the Beatles landed at New York's JFK airport, for their first U.S. tour.

* One year later, George Harrison's tonsils were removed!

* In 1974, American left-wing guerilla group, the Symbionese Liberation Army, claimed responsibility for the kidnapping of Patty Hearst, daughter of American publishing heir Randolph Hearst.

* Pink Floyd premiered their live version of "The Wall" at the Los Angeles Memorial Sports Arena in California in 1980.

* Just last year, LeBron James scored 38 points to become the NBS's alltime leading scorer as the Lakers went down 133 – 130 to the Oklahoma City Thunder in Los Angeles. He surpassed Kareem Abdul-Jabbar's 38,387 career points.

This week, Ted ended his presentation with a most interesting event that took place in 1959: American pilots Bob Timm and John Cook broke the former flight endurance record, exceeding 1,550 hours (64 days, 22 hours, and 19 minutes), landing "The Hacienda", their modified Cessna 172 where they started, in Las Vegas, Nevada. Here's the whole story:

In 1958, the two men in a Cessna took off on a nonstop 150,000-mile (240,000 kilometers) flight around the desert outside Las Vegas and set a record that still stands today. The flight lasted over two months. The distance was about six times around the Earth or 15 Sydney – New York flights without touching the ground.

It started as a flying billboard for the Hacienda Hotel. In 1956, an entrepreneur wanted to promote his las Vegas hotal, and his slot machine mechanic, Robert Timm, a WW2 bomber pilot, had an idea. The Hacienda Hotel and Casino had just opened at the southern end of the Las Vegas Strip, and its owners wanted to promote the hotel as one of the first family-oriented resorts in the city.

Timm convinced the owner to fund an attempt to break the manned flight endurance record, with Hacienda Hotel featured prominently on the aircraft. He found a Cessna 172, registered N9217B, and with a trusted mechanic, spent a year modifying it for the record attempt.

The two made several changes to the 4-seater propeller aircraft. The most significant modifications included the addition of a fuel tank in the belly to supplement the 47 gallons carried in the wings. The 95-gallon belly tank had an electric pump to transfer fuel to the main tank, and they also replumbed the oil lines to change oil and filters without shutting down the engine.

Further additions included a mattress to nap on, a small sink for personal hygiene, and a foldable camp toilet.

Robert Timm and co-pilot John Wayne Cook took off on December 4th, 1958, at 15:52. They first made a low pass on the airfield to allow a

chase car to paint white stripes on the aircraft's tires to ensure they didn't make any secret landings. The paint would scuff upon touchdown, and the resulting marks would be visible when "officially" landing. They spent most of their time flying over the deserts around Las Vegas, sometimes diverting to Los Angeles for TV promotional opportunities.

Now for the really ingenious method of refueling. Twice daily, a truck fitted with a fuel tank and pump would rendezvous with the aircraft over a straight stretch of closed highway along the California-Arizona border. This was ground-to-air refueling at its best! The Cessna would fly roughly 20 feet off the ground and use an electric winch to lower a hook and snag the refueling hose. Timm or Cook would stand on a platform outside the door and insert the hose into the belly tank, taking around three minutes to fill. Over the course of the flight, they refueled 128 times.

Food was provided complements of The Hacienda, which prepared gourmet meals. Some of the magic of the quality food was lost in transit, as the food had to be chopped up and stuffed into thermos jugs to get up to the pilots. A quart of water was also sent up for bathing every other day.

Thirty-nine days in, the generator failed, so they had no lights, heat, or fuel pump. The pair relied on a hand pump to transfer fuel and soon after had to refuel in the dark, with no lights or moon. They passed the existing record of 50 days, but decided to keep flying for as long as possible. Sleeping was difficult even with the mattress due to the engine's noise and the planes' vibrations. At one point, Timm fell asleep while flying for over an hour, and the aircraft was kept aloft thanks to a rudimentary autopilot they had installed. The autopilot failed days later.

By the beginning of February, the spark plugs and combustion chambers were loaded with carbon, making it difficult to climb with a full load after refueling. They decided to land on February 7th, 1959, but before they could touch down, the paint on the tires was checked, and no scuff marks were found.

Timm and Cook had to be lifted out of the Cessna, and their record still stands today. Robert Timm died in 1976 and John Cook in 1995, both in Las Vegas, and the Hacienda Hotel was demolished in December, 1996. The famed Cessna 172 now hangs above the baggage carousel at Las Vegas Harry Reid International Airport (LAS).

SCOTT RYAN, CHIEF OF COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT OHIO DEPARTMENT OF DEVELOPMENT



Scott Ryan is the Chief of Community Engagement for the Ohio Department of Development. In that role, Scott assists the Department's mission of empowering communities to succeed by connecting with and supporting community leaders as they navigate challenges associated with economic development.

Scott served three terms in the Ohio House of Representatives for the 71st District and served as a member of House leadership as chair of the House Finance Committee. Scott is passionate about serving communities in need and has been a champion for mental health and addiction causes at the state level. His legislative priorities also included local government and business issues.

Scott has been the owner of a printing company for more than 25 years and previously served as Licking County Treasurer. A thirdgeneration resident of Licking County and a member of the Granville High School Class of 1983, he graduated from Miami University in 1987 with a Bachelor of Science in Business Administration.

Scott has extensive volunteer leadership experience with local nonprofit organizations, including service as a member of the Board of Directors for First United Methodist Church in Newark, the Licking County Family YMCA, and United Way of Licking County.


He and his wife, Sheila, live in Newark, and they have two adult daughters.


Scott began his visit with our club by applauding the Rotary Club of Warren for being the "backbone of the community" for more than 100 years. He then went on the highlight some of the biggest projects that the Ohio Department of Development has helped to secure under the leadership of Governor Mike Dewine, including technological advancements like electric vehicles and integrated electronic. He indicated that these manufacturing projects increase our area's goods and services and benefit our businesses and families. And the most important factor is that they are made in Ohio. In this way, Ohio is investing in itself and collaborating with state and local governments to achieve a shared vision.

Moving forward, in 2024, the Ohio Department of Development is planning the following investments:

- 1. \$1 billion will be invested in community transformations, such as ensuring that everyone has high speed internet access, tearing down dilapidated buildings, and making sure that drinking water is safe.
- 2. The All Ohio Future Fund will offer \$750 million to make available sites project-ready.
- 3. The Appalachian Community Grant Program will invest in the workforce and healthcare in the Appalachian Region, which will help attract new businesses from around the world to our area.
- 4. The Department of Development is dedicated to assisting small businesses with certification and access to funds. \$20 million in loans will be made available to more than 200 minority businesses, and more than 4,000 small businesses will be provided with counseling.
- 5. Innovation hubs will continue to be developed in order to support collaboration at the local level and assist communities in retaining local talent.

Scott closed by saying that all of these projects are investments in the quality of life of our residents.
