

We lay before You all the disappointments and unfinished work, and we ask for Your mercy, peace and joy as we look to the year ahead.


May we delight in the gift of Your presence as we discern the journey You have for us this new year.

Ray Sinchak treated us to a story about an individual who was considered to be a great American, even though he wasn't born in the United States – Bob Hope. Leslie Townes "Bob" Hope was a British-born comedian, actor, entertainer and producer. He had a career that spanned nearly 80 years and was well known for achievements in vaudeville, network radio, television, and, of course, his United Service Organizations (USO) tours, during which he entertained military personnel around the world. Ray commented that Bob Hope's stamina was amazing. He often performed at four USO shows a day.

In 1955, Bob Hope was asked to play Eddie Foy in the lead role of The Seven Little Foys. After the movie was filmed, a test resulted in a lukewarm reception. As a result, James Cagney was asked to reprise his role as George M. Cohan and play alongside Bob Hope in the film. However, Cagney didn't want to fly to Hollywood, so they filmed closer

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to his home, with one offshoot being filmed in Boston. Cagney was very dedicated to his art of dancing and a big critic of his own work. As a result, it took two weeks to shoot a five minute scene!





# ROB BERK, PAST TIMES ARCADE



This week's speaker is no stranger to Rotary. Rob Berk joined The Rotary Club of Warren in September of 1985. During his 38 years with our club, he has served as President and has spearheaded our biggest fundraiser, The Slice of the Valley Pizza Challenge. He currently serves as President of Berk Enterprises and founder of Past Times Arcade, which opened in Girard this past summer. Rob joined us this week to give us a bit of history about pinball and his new destination for fun.

So, how did pinball all begin? The earliest pinball game consisted of a board with holes in it, and one used a billiard stick to move the balls around pins. A lot of pinball manufacturers were out of the Youngstown area in the 1930s. In 1947, the introduction of flippers revolutionized the game of pinball and took the industry by storm. Kits were sold to add flippers to games that didn't have them. In the 1950s and 60s, certain

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states outlawed pinball due to players and spectators gambling on the games. However, pinball eventually re-emerged as a legitimate pastime, and in 1976, the first electronic game was made. Manufacturers later incorporated more and more modern technological changes, such as lighting and sounds.

As video games gained in popularity, interest in pinball waned. However, in the late 90s, Gary Stern founded Stern Pinball and saved the day by manufacturing new and original pinball machines. Artwork and graphics on the machines became intricate, and toys and gadgets became a fun feature.

Today, Rob said that the future of pinball lies in the kids. As a result, manufacturers are always trying to find new features to attract their interest, just like Stern did.

Where does Rob fit into the pinball craze? Well, Rob has been a lifelong fan of pinball. His childhood home had a pinball machine. Back in 1963, Rob took a trip to Florida with his father, and due to unforeseen circumstances, got stuck in a place with nothing to do except gaming. Later, while attending Kent State University, his interest in pinball machines was further ignited. He began collecting pinball machines in the 1970s. He gravitates towards games made in the 60s, with his favorite being Fever Magic.

In 1985, Rob decided to hold a convention to honor his heroes – the designers and artists behind the pinball machine. These expos are still going strong today. Rob said he's met all kinds of people through his conventions.

Over the years, Rob amassed a collection of over 1,000 pinball machines, and finally decided it was time to share them with the world. He bought the vacant Santisi's IGA building and put his plan for an arcade into motion. The arcade has 600 machines available for playing dating back to the 1960s plus more modern video games, as well as a concession area which serves light snacks and great milkshakes. Past Times offers individual play, as well as tournament play, and hosts corporate events.

Finally, here are just a few last tidbits provided by Rob:

- 1. The artwork, sounds and difficulty of the shots are what makes a good game; and
- 2. The longest record for playtime is 60 hours!
