

Diane Sauer then took center stage to share the interesting history behind New Year's resolutions. New Year's resolutions actually go back to ancient times. From



the Babylonians, who resolved to return borrowed farm equipment, to medieval knights who renewed their vows to chivalry, New Year's resolutions are nothing new. In 2000 B.C., the Babylonians held a 12-day festival called Akitu to celebrate the New Year. It started at the vernal equinox, the beginning of the farming season when crops were planted, kings were crowned, and promises were made to pay debts. One common resolution was the return of borrowed farm equipment. After all, it was an agriculturally based society.

The Babylonian New Year was also adopted by the ancient Romans, as was the tradition of resolutions. The timing of the New Year, however, eventually shifted to the Julian calendar in 46 B.C., which declared January 1st as the start of the new year.

January was named for the two-faced Roman god, Janus, who looks forward to new beginnings, as well as backward for reflection and resolution. The Romans made sacrifices to Janus and promises of good behavior for the year ahead.



Janus was also the guardian of gates and doors. He presided over the temple of peace, where doors were opened only during wartime. It was a place of safety where new beginnings and resolutions could be forged.

Fast forward to today in Europe and North America. If you think about the land and the seasons, the timing of early January as New Year's Day makes sense. The harvest season has passed. The hustle and bustle of the holidays is ending. It's a time of leisure for farmers, settling accounts with your neighbors, and retiring to the bosom of your family.

Whether or not you pooh-pooh this tradition of New Year's resolutions, we can all look at January as a new beginning - a time to continue good practices, change undesired behaviors, and work towards accomplishing personal goals.



OPENING NIGHT




It's hard to capture the magic of a dancing light show in a still picture.


