

Christine Cope based this month's Environmental Talk on excerpts from the book, *Great Migrations*. In this book, National Geographic covers the monarch butterfly's remarkable migration across North America, which is considered one of Earth's greatest natural events.

Christine explained that the monarch butterflies' journey begins in Mexico, with the female monarchs leading the butterflies north. Their parents do not lead them, as they die soon after they lay eggs. The butterflies know where to go by instinct. Sunlight signals them to migrate and helps guide them.

Migrating monarchs fly 30 miles per hour and typically fly 50 to 100 miles a day, although the farthest recorded distance is 265 miles in one day. Each year, three or four generations complete the trip north, but only one generation makes the return trip back to Mexico. One generation starts the migration and their great, great grandchildren finish it! Adult butterflies live two to six weeks. During the spring, the first generation hatches in the south, flies north as far as it can and later dies. The second generation continues the journey, lays eggs and dies. The third and fourth generations hatch through the spring and summer and finish the journey north. At the end of summer, a special super generation hatches and lives six to nine months. They fly back to Mexico over the winter, from October to March. It's amazing that although butterflies weigh less than a paper clip, they are strong enough to fly 2,000 miles, flocking to the trees for shelter during high winds and rain! When they return to Mexico, they are regarded as the souls of loved ones who have passed on.

There are four stages in a butterfly's life: the egg, the caterpillar, the chrysalis and the butterfly. A mother butterfly places her eggs on milkweed leaves over a period of four days. These are hard-working mamas! The female can carry up to 400 eggs and places only one or two eggs on each leaf.

A caterpillar hatches from the egg and eats milkweed all day long. In two weeks, it grows to be two inches long. The caterpillar creates a hard, protective coating around itself called a chrysalis. Approximately 10 days later, when the chrysalis opens, a butterfly is born.

Adult monarchs eat the nectar from flowering plants, including milkweed. The nectar gives them energy to fly.

Christine explained that butterflies and all pollinators are crucial for food security, biodiversity, healthy ecosystems and more. Without them, our survival, as well as that of many plants and animals, is at risk. For this reason, Christine encouraged everyone to plant milkweed and other flowering plants that attract pollinators and watch these miracles in our own backyards.

She ended with this quote from Mario Quintana, a Brazilian writer and translator:

"Don't waste your time chasing butterflies. Mend your garden, and the butterflies will come."

SEAN MCBANE, GENERAL MANAGER ROBINS THEATRE



Sean McBane, pictured above with Warren Rotary's President - Elect Tony Iannucci, is a graduate of Warren G. Harding High School and later studied Business Management, Marketing and Related Support Services at Youngstown State University. He worked for 18 years as Finance Manager and Salesman at a car dealership, and has served as General Manager of Robins Theatre since April of 2022. He visited with club members this week and presented the history of the theatre.

Robins Theatre is an historic theatre and live music venue that presents a wide array of entertainment in Downtown Warren, Ohio. The theatre was commissioned by Daniel Robins, an early partner of Abraham Warner of the Warner Brothers. Built in 1922, the building is designed in the Italian Renaissance style. It opened to a full house on January 9, 1923. The theatre was originally used for vaudeville productions and screening motion pictures. In its early years, the theatre had a smaller stage, with separate seating and entrances for minorities (a sign of the times), and portholes for projection. It remained in operation until 1974.

In 2017, the Robins Theatre was purchased by Downtown Development Group. Mark Marvin wanted to help revitalize Downtown Warren. He brought condominiums, restaurants and bars to the area. While the theatre was close to being unrecoverable and torn down, Mark was asked to tackle its restoration. The original seats were re-upholstered, the stage was enlarged, and in 2024, a loge was created.

Robins Theatre re-opened on January 9, 2020, and for the first three months, shows were sold out. Then the COVID-19 Pandemic hit, putting a stop to live shows. The theatre continued to show movies with social distancing.

Today, Robins Theatre is equipped to accommodate concerts, stage shows and film screenings. The theatre seats 1,406 and hosts 55 to 60 shows per year. Its Summer Movie Series begins tonight. There are two promotors for the theatre – Kenny Haidaras, who presents national acts, and Tom Simpson, who presents tribute acts.
